S.S. LANE VICTORY (VC2-S-AP2) scale 1/32 (1: 384). Built in balsa wood by the "lift" (bread and butter) method from a kit. LANE VICTORY completed June, 1945 in Los Angeles, CA. Used in the Pacific in World War II and during the Korean War. Reactivated in 1966, LANE VICTORY used for VIETNAM service. Deactivated in 1972, in 1988 title was transferred to the U.S. Merchant Marine Veterans of World War II for use as a floating museum.



British 12 pound naval gun by **Dick Roos.** 1:16 scale kit by Artesanea Latina. Plain use of minwax finish. Used 'aluminum blackening' by Birchwood-Casey (found in gun finishing store).

this is an Amati kit with very little information on the box regarding scale or background. He is using beech for hull planking, walnut for deck planking, rails, etc, and boxwood for the gratings. He is using Min-wax finish "in rough" for old look (presumably 1700-1800). Three shades of wax used for tone variation.





Greek Bireme by **Ed Trasoras.** Scale-unknown, but a whole lot bigger than those Trafalgar models. This is a model of a warship from over 2500 years ago. It was approximately 80 feet long and 10 feet wide with 44 oarsmen. Fleets roamed the Mediterranean. If need be, they could stay out at sea for a day or two, but normally pulled in to shore each night. Sailing this ship was tricky since it was relatively flat bottomed and would easily capsize. Sails were primarily used to sail downwind. This ship had a bronze bow ram which could be used to sink an opponent. The model is finally done after nine months!!! Ed spend a lot of time on the detail and sanding. Elmer's glue was all he used except when securing the brass fittings he used super glue. Tung oil was used for the finish. It worked really well and made the wood planking stand out nicely. He thought the oars would be hard to make but mass production had them done in a couple nights. Inlaying the brass was a task requiring weeks to do right. The sail is one of Ed's world famous 'multi layered tissue paper' sails. It looks a lot better than the cloth sail that came with it. Great job Ed! What next?

PINTA by **Dick Little**. PINTA was the middle-sized of the three ships used by Christopher Columbus on his first voyage of discovery. It was about 74 feet long and 20 feet wide with a crew of 25. PINTA was a caravel like the NINA, but unlike SANTA MARIA which was a slower, heavier nao. This is a 1:48 scale kit from Mantua. It is double plank on bulkhead, with a walnut outer planking. The kit is well done, but the lines of the running rigging were not clearly described, especially where they tie down on deck or rails.

Gunboat PHILAELPHIA, by **Dave Yotter**. Scratch built, 1:16 scale. The gunboat PHILADELPHIA was part of Benedict Arnold's colonial fleet built and assembled on Lake Champlain in August 1776 to thwart the British advance south from Canada. PHILADELPHIA was sunk at the battle of Valcour Island in October 1776. The wreck was salvaged in 1936 by Colonel Lorenzo Hagglund and then will to the Smithsonian in 1961. Howard Hoffman of the Smithsonian drew plans of the PHILADELPHIA and all her artifacts. Dave used these plans to build the model. The artifacts are on display at the Smithsonian and there is at least one replica of the gunboat on the water. Dave used beech since it is a close replica of miniature oak, which was used in the original. Spars are spruce. The cannons are sand cast in bronze and blackened to represent the cast iron of the original. The model is assembled with brass nails (doll house nails) with the heads squared and blackened. "Ironwork" is of brass shapes, soldered and blackened. He is currently working on the swivel gun mounts and cannon balls.

The Galleon Roter Lowe was built in the Netherlands in 1597 and was bought by the Council of Konigsberg. It was in service as a vedette-boat in Pillau from 1602 to 1605 under captain Peter Hintze's command.

The Roter Lowe (Red Lion) was a versatile 18 gun scouting vessel. She was often pressed into service to carry cargo. This is a Mamoli double plank-on-bulkhead kit.. Structural woods are tanganyka, mahogany, maple, poplar, boxwood and beech. Planking is limewood and walnut. Ornamental fittings are turned brass, copper and steel. Scale 1:55.

Great job Dave, especially on the figures. What next?


