NRG 2006 By Robert Hewitt

We started our meetings for the planning of the NRG in January. Our first task was to squeeze all of the events onto two ships. At one time the plan was to put some of the vendors on the orlop deck. Chuck Seiler and I surveyed both of the ships to determine the maximum number of tables we could fit on board. We also had to satisfy Jim Davis with aisle space requirements and access to all of the museum's displays. We decided to not use the orlop for other than Jacki Jones' dance group and sawdust sessions. We squeezed forty- four tables onto the ships; there were fourteen on the *BERKELEY* and thirty on the *STAR of INDIA*. Our first actual duty was on Saturday- stuffing all of the canvas tote bags with catalogs and other goodies. The bags are decorated with a yellow and blue logo featuring the *STAR* and the Coronado Bridge in the background. The logo style is by Bob Crawford and the design was made by Gus Agustin of Chicago. The name badges were made and envelopes assembled and alphabetized.

The following Wednesday the rented tables arrived and I was happy to see that the order was correct, as I had to change it four times. The table set-up went quickly. As the drapes and covers were being applied, we were informed that there was going to be a school sleep-over on the *STAR* that night and all of the tables needed to be out of the way. Thanks to **Ron Render**, the tables were numbered and stacked forward of the hatch.

The next day, thanks to me, we were all in at 7:00 a.m. only to find that because of the overnight we could not get onto the *STAR* until 9:00. The children were off at exactly 9:00 and we re-set and covered the table tops. The vendors, the attendees, and the ship models started arriving along with the general public. Luckily the *BERKELEY* tables were finished and all of the arriving models were placed there. Karen Johl was in the library typing the plaques, and the model placement went quickly and smoothly. The small models on the *STAR* created a bit of a problem as to viewing and security. Salmon boxes were brought up from the orlop deck and placed on top of the tables. Ron Render donated some planks from his work shop so we had most of the minis at a better viewing position. We also had plastic covering the easily- taken models. I had Gus Agustin's models in my care and these were the first to be covered. The model display went well- no damage, no missing models, no complaints-yet. However I did see one guy sneak out with a riverboat without turning in his ticket!

Speaking of tickets, at the November meeting, we will be dispensing unclaimed raffle items left over from the Conference. **Richard Strange** will give a talk about lead corrosion in ship models. Richard will also supply informational hand-outs. We'll also be planning the December Holiday meeting, so be there or be square.


