Bob is building Model Shipways 1:76 scale *Constitution* as she sits today in Boston Harbor. Bob is currently working on the port and starboard gallery trim.




HMS FLY Mike Lonnecker

She captured several French Privateers during the French Revolution. She eventually floundered off Newfoundland in 1802 with the loss of all hands. Mike's model is being built using the 4 volumes of books by David Antscherl and Greg Herburt. Mike has completed the keel, dead woods and cant frames.

Based on Model Shipways plans at 1:16 scale, Bob is using cherry wood for the planking and holly for the ribs. Instructions are from Erik A.P. Ronnberg Jr.'s "To Build a Whaleboat". Bob hopes to have this done in time for the next Fair.



FIGUREHEAD John Sauvajot

This figurehead is a copy of HMS *Surprise*, located at the San Diego Maritime Museum. The figurehead will be used on the model of HMS *Surprise* being planned and eventually built by Joe Bompenserio. John uses a two part epoxy clay purchased from Michael Roberts called "Apoxie Sculpt" by Aves. The figurehead is beautifully carved and shows great detail. John says that after mixing the two parts the clay can be worked for approximately 45 minutes before it hardens. At that point it can be carved, sanded, and painted.

Jury-Rigged (makeshift)

In nautical parlance, jury denotes a temporary contrivance, such as a jury-mast or jury-rudder used to get a ship underway after she has been disabled. The word jury is derived from the Latin word jurare (to swear an oath), but the origin of jury in its nautical application is not known. It has been suggested that the word was coined by cynical sailors and is a shortened version of injury-rigged. Anything temporary or improvised is considered to be "jury-rigged." Frequently mispronounced as "jerry-rigged," the term is used ashore to describe something improvised or thrown together hastily.
