

## **July's Monthly Models**



Don Dressel brought in his spectacular Model Shipways 1:48 Longboat. Part of a community build from 2015, the kit featured plank-on-frame construction with a removable bulkhead system to produce the open interior.







James Pitt presented a freestyle project—a pirate junk! Inspired by pirate vessels of East Asia, James is converting a junk trawler into an adapted piracy vessel, much like actual types that operated in those waters. Since this model is not based on any specific example, he is free to develop the design and install details as he sees fit.



Chris Sullivan shared his 1:700
Hasegawa kit of the "helicopterdestroyer" *Izumo* of the Japanese
Maritime Self-Defense Force. To
depict the embarked aircraft,
Chris turned to his spares box to
include helicopters as well as V-22
Osprey tilt rotors. The yellow gear
flight deck equipment also came
from spares. The kit is depicted as
a waterline model since the lower
hull was badly warped!





An old build of Karl Zingheim's from a dozen years ago surfaced in the form of a diorama of the USS *Tirante* running out of the Japanese harbor of Ha Shima on the surface after sinking a merchantman pierside on 12 June 1945. The boat's bow planes would not retract when on the surface, which caused a great deal of turbulence as the submarine tried to dash out to sea, chased by fire from shore batteries. The kit is a slightly modified 1:144 Trumpeter Gato kit, with White Ensign deck guns, including a pair of 40mm Bofors, and a 5-inch 25-calibre gun. Crew figures are modified Preiser model railroad figures. The water base is textured modeling paste.
