



IS YOUR HOBBY KILLING YOU

The following is a list of chemicals and items used in our craft of model ship building which can have an effect on our health and lives if not evaluated properly with respect to its potential dangers.

Cadmium: in solder

Cadmium fumes when soldering cause a deadly poison for which there is no cure or antidote. Make sure when you buy your solder you read the fine print.

Ammonia

Liquid ammonia used in model making to bend wood is an eye irritant causing cough and edema of lungs. Use with adequate forced ventilation.

Acetone

When used to clean epoxy, especially off your hands, acetone can enter into your system through your pores. Rinse areas immediately after use.

Asbestos

Pads used to rest the work to be soldered. The fine dust from it can give you cancer, emphysema or even leukemia. Use a particle filter mask.

Benzine

Another proven agent that's detrimental to your health — proper ventilation and rinse.

Styrofoam

Sometimes used in making molds and models. When heated or burned causes toxic gases.

Hydrogen sulfide

Used in blacking of brass fittings and cannon. It is a deadly poison. Use proper ventilation.

Carbon Tetrochloride

A cleaning solvent found in your home is a dangerous agent. Use proper ventilation.

Flux for Soldering

Contains fluorides which also produce hydrofluoric acid and can burn the lungs. Use with proper ventilation.

Dust

From grinding or metal fillings, or from sanding. It can cause silicosis, though it may take years before it surfaces, causing lung malfunction.

Acetyline (ethine)

Dangerously toxic. Can be fatal if prolonged breathing.

Butane

Gas causes drowsiness if prolonged exposure to it.

These have been just a few of the most common agents used by the model maker and to say, "Oh! I do very little work of that kind, I just don't think it will affect me, I'm in no danger. How much exposure is little or dangerous."

When working with the above items, make sure you have taken proper precautions for your safety and health.
