

The earliest of the Baltimore Clippers built as blockade runners for the war of 1812. These topsail schooners, with their low freeboard, deep draft, raked stem, and overhanging transom, were able to sail close to the wind, "clipping along" at 12 knots or more. Built in Baltimore and other Chesapeake Bay shipyards, they were used as privateers and later for running slaves and opium, smuggling, and for U.S. Revenue Marine (Coast Guard). Later designs added yards to foremast creating more of a brigantine rig, until 1832 a Baltimore clipper hull was built with a full ship rig, and the Ann Mc Kim became the forerunner of the true clipper ship.

After introductions and show and tell, elections were held. Our new Master is FRED FRAAS, and our new First Mate is ROY NILSON. Congratulations to both. With the meeting turned over to our new Master, new business was brought up, including a discussion of continuing a Guild membership in the Argonauts for the purpose of coordinating the use of the pond, and a discussion of radio frequencies. Once again a suggestion was made to use frequency chips on Saturday mornings. The FCC has just opened up new frequencies for model boats, which amounts to our having all of the 27 and all of the 75 band. A complete listing appears in the February issue of MODEL AVIATION.

Program Notes

It was good to have Bob Becker back with us as he gave a presentation on his latest endeavors (while taking a break on the ENDEAVOUR). When seeing the movie POPEYE, he was intrigued by the scenes and the appearence of the houses. This led him to making replicas of lighthouses. He is now on his 14th lighthouse, and they sure look nice.

Part of the authenticity of the replicas is the antiquing that is done. Antiquing is

not very hard to do, as Bob demonstrated.

Start with a solution that is roughly 50% ammonia, 50% vinegar, with 2 tablespoons of salt.

This solution is used on copper, first steel wooling the lacquer off. The solution is smeared on with a brush and burnished in.

Now comes the real key to the process. Put the copper in the hot sunshine. It will usually take 4 or 5 coats to get the desired effect. When the level of corrosion is achieved, the reaction is stopped by airbrushing lacquer over the surface.

For wood, Bob uses an Olympic stain and then adds a driftwood color. If this is done while the stain is wet, you will get different colors, if done when dry it will come out very

light.

For roofs, he uses an antique green and then he white washes the area being worked on.



THE PRIDE OF BALTIMORE

The PRIDE OF BALTIMORE was hand built by crafters in Baltimore as part of their Bicentenial celebration. It is a full sized replica of a Baltimore Clipper designed by Melbourne Smith. She is 90' on deck, 136' from the tip of the bowsprit to the end of her boom, and has a 23' beam. A Topsail schooner, she also can carry a topgallent and studding sails, as we saw when she came into San Diego.


The PRIDE OF BALTIMORE is on a goodwill tour representing her namesake and port of origin. Her 12 person crew has come through the canal and has made her way up the coast visiting both South American and Central American ports. Her 17,000 mile journey began last October. From San Diego she will head up the coast, visiting ports as far north as Vacouver.

Her entrtance was spectacular, and I was fortunate to be invited to be a guest crew member on the RENDEZVOUS as she helped to escort the PRIDE into port. It was an eventful trip for us, as we had a Coast Guard Bouy Tender working on Bouy 17 on the way out, tracked two larger whales for an hour, and then set all our canvas as we joined up with the PRIDE on her weather side about 1100. We were close enough to exchange verbal greetings and get our eardrums blown out as she fired a cannon salvo salute. A little later there was another salute to the 12 meters SPIRIT OF AMERICA and LIBERTY as they headed out for their daily workout. The only event to mar the day was a loud CRACK we heard about 300 yards astern as we passed the free anchorage off Shelter Island. I looked back to see a mast of a 37' sailboat at anchor splashing into the water with MEDEA sideswiping the poor boat.

The PRIDE OF BALTIMORE will be at the foot of Broadway Pier until the 21st, and will be open to the public on Saturday and Sunday from noon until 5 p.m.

I make no promises, but I'm working in seeing if we can get a couple of the crew to give a presentation at our meeting this Friday.

As a side note, a similar effort at building a replica is happening up in Newport Beach, with Melbourne Smith designing a Revenue Cutter of similar design called the CALIFORNIAN, which is expected to be ready for the Olympic Games festivies.
