## CALIFORNIAN KEEL IS LAID

On the Fourth of July a good crowd gathered at the beach at Spanish Landing, where San Diego history really started to witness another historic event. With a four cannon salute, the raising of flags and a champagne teast, the 12 ton keel for the topsail schooner CALIFORNIAN was rolled into place.

Under the direction of naval architect Melbourne Smith, who built the PRIDE OF BALTIMORE, this 130 ton vessel will take shape over the next 10 months with a launching estimated for early May 1984. The CALIFORNIAN will be a full sized replica of the first revenue cutter to operate on the West Coast, the LAWRENCE. She will be 90' on deck, 145' overall, with a beam of 24'8". Many of our members know Steve Christman of the Nautical Heritage Museum of Dana Point, who is the director of the project. He informed your logkeeper that plans, and eventually kits of the CALIFORNIAN will be available. Membership in the museum is a primary source of support for the project. The ship has been designated the Official Tallship of California and will represent the State at the 1984 Olympics in Los Angeles, and in OPSAIL'86 in New York. She will be used primarily as a sail training ship and will apprently do some charter work.

Our Guild was represented at the keel laying by the logkeeper, who signed the keel on the Guild's behalf. I will also attempt to keep a photo record of her progress. Steve has invited us to have a meeting at the Spanish Landing site, and they will be happy to tell us all about the project. How about for August? The frame should be well along at that point.

Master Fred Fraus promptly opened the meeting at 10 minutes past 8 bells. Our Captain ordered McFarland & Nilson to take minutes. Note: It took two men to replace Bill who was on shore leave at meeting time.

Some of our members were seen at the opening of the Aero-Space Museum carrier displayment health thought the standard and party signification of the mural, making a very realistic diorama.

The annual Regatta planning is in progress at this writing. The Picnic-Regatta will be for static as well as R/C members alike, with a Bar-B-Q on Saturday evening. More info will be forth coming.

Ahoy Mates! I've got a couple of scoops for you from by perch by the bay.

Modeler DON HUBBARD of Coronado has a display at the public library downtown at 820 'E' Street this month of July. Included are his marine watercolors, ships-in-bottles, Japanese fish prints, and ivory scrimshaw.

The RENDEZVOUS is definately leaving. September 6 will apparently be her last working day here in San Diego before heading for her new home in San Francisco. In the Bay area the brigantine will operate in conjunction with the "Rendezvous" restaurant.

The possibility of a schooner to replace her are not promising. If we want a last chance to sail on a square rigger in San Diego Bay, we need to make arrangements very soon. To charter her, we need to confirm at least 35-40 passengers. Is there enough interest out there? We can do a 2 hour cruise for about \$12 each, and a 3 hour cruise for about \$15 each. In the past we've made it a dinner or a dessert (pot-luck) event. A couple of ideas have been offered... a full moon dinner cruise on August 23 (Tuesday), or combined with a visit to the CALIFORNIAN site since it is located only a quarter mile form the dock for the RENDEZVOUS. Let me know Friday night what you think. This time we MUST have enough to break even BEFORE committing ourselves to the charter.

We've received another edition of the "Pride's Log." She is now in Oregon, and will be in several California ports in August:

Sacramen to August 10-15 Rio Vista August 18-20 Stocton August 24-29

San Francisco August 31-September 6.

When she stopped in Vancouver in June, the festivities included boatbuilding and model making demonstrations.
