FOUR REGATTAS COMING UP

We have word now of four West Coast R/C regattas, including our own on September 24th. Here is the rundown:

August 28: Ship Modelers Association and Helmsmen Yacht Club regatta at El Dorado Park in Long Beach. A reproduction of their flyer with all the details appears on page 6.

September 10-11: Golden Gate Club regatta in San Francisco. Bob Ross will have this Bay area regatta flyer at our meeting on Friday.

September 24-25: SAN DIEGO SHIP MODELERS GUILD ANNUAL FALL REGATTA at Vacation Village. This year the events have been simplified with the emphasis on having fun. The Sunday activities will be for fun running. This year there will be a static contests as well as the in the water regatta, so static modelers, make your plans. The contest rules appear on pages 7 and 8.

October 1 and 2, Regatta in the Phoenix, Arizona area. (no details yet)

THREE TALL SHIPS VISIT SAN DIEGO

Two tall ships are currently in port. The year old CUAUHTEMOC, and the SAGRES. Both are three masted barks used for training naval officers. The CUAUHTEMOC is Mexico's entry into the tall ship fleet. Built in Spain last year, she carries 3h officers, 120 enlisted men, and 70 midshipmen. Demensions were not available at press time. She is at Broadway pier until Saturday, before heading for San Francisco.

The Portugese bark SAGRES is making a return trip here as a part of the Cabrillo festival. She is easily identified under sail by red Maltese cross on each square sail. Berthed at B Street pier, she carries 90 crew, 9 officers, and 104 cadets. Weighing 1784 tons, she is 293' 8" long overall, has a beam of 39'6" and a draft of 24'9". She is scheduled to be here through the weekend. Both ships are scheduled for open houses daily from 3 to 6 p.m.

As if this is not enough, the Chilean fourmasted topsail schooner (not a barkentine as some might say) ESMERALDA will be in August 25 - 28. This is the much younger sister of the JUAN SERASTIAN DE ELCANO, which visited here in April. One of the largest of the tall ships, she was built in the same yards as the J. S. De ELCANO and to the same basic plans. She is 2478 tons, 370' long and 308' high. Due to political controversy over her past uses, she was not open to the public the last time she was here several years ago. I have not heard about her being open to the public this time, but with the current uprisings in Chile, the prospects are dim.

MOLDING PLASTIC PARTS

The Dave Manley Way

A few months ago Dave Manley showed us how he casts all his parts for his models. Here is a step by step presentation of his method. Dave says that if this does not work the first time, do not dispare, try again. Some times the parts will not come out right for various reasons. All of his SAN DIEGO was made using this process.

TO DO THIS YOU WILL NEED:

A prototype of the part desired.

Vaseline or similar petroleum jelly.

Silicone rubber used for sealing bathtubs, it comes in tubes and can be used with a gun designed for use in such purposes. The clear kind is best to use.

Casting or laminating resin. Finishing resin doesn't work as well.

A piece of paper or cardboard to set the mold on.

STEP 1:

Obtain the prototype, either from an original part to be copied, or make it yourself.

STEP 2:

Put the prototype on a sheet of paper with the side not wanted down against the paper. A box could be built up around the part.




STEP 3:

Cover the prototype with Vaseline or similar substance to prevent adhersion to the mold.

STEP 4:

Smear silicone rubber all around the prototype part, totally covering the part.



STEP 5
Let the rubber dry. The thicker the coat, the longer it takes.
A coat of 1/8" usually takes 5 days.

STEP 6:
Once dry, pop out the prototype. You now have the mold.

STEP 7:
Prepare the resin. If strength is desired, add fiberglass cloth or strands into the mold before pouring in the resin.

STEP 8:
Pour the resin into the mold. No vaseline is needed in this part of the process.

STEP 9: Let dry. This will normally take about three hours.

STEP 10: Pop out the part and finish off as needed.

PROJECT UPDATE

In the past week or so the ribs have been going up on this unique sailing ship. The frames were pre-made of long leaf yellow pine in a shop that specializes in making frames in order to save time and to have a more solid skeleton. It has been very enlightening to watch the actual construction methods being used. In future issues we will try and discuss some of them.

The directors of the project have offered to do a program for us on the site. I'd like to propose that we gather on Saturday, September 17, 1983 in the early afternoon (the pond will be closed that day). They will tell us about the history and the project, and of course about the methods of construction. They also expect the arrival of at least one of their ship's boats a few days before that. This could be an open event for our guests and for modelers from other clugs in the Southern California Area. (By the way, those of you coming to our regatta the following week will want to stop by and see this project.)


At our party last month we had Bob and Susan Bickley present. They are owners of Reed's Hobby shop in La Mesa, which recently expanded to include model

WHERE: El Dorado Park, Long Beach, Cal. There is a \$2.00 per car entry fee into the park. (See map on other side. Map is not to scale).



- 1. Straight Steering and Maneuvering: (Power and Sail)
- 2. Predicted Time: (Power and Sail) Around a predicted course.
- 3. Special: Devices and Effects demonstration.

Note: 50% of points will be awarded for "stand-off" scale appearance, in and out of water, and craftsmanship.

2. Model should be a scale version of an actual ship or boat.

3. Models must be radio-controlled and may be operated only by the owner/builder. No substitute skippers please.

4. Judging will be performed by a three judge panel.

5. Models will be judged from a distance of 5 feet. (stand-off

6. The decisions of the judges will be final. scale)

7. Judging criteria -- 100 points maximum.

SCALE OPERATION COURSE RULES:

1. Judging will be based on a 30 point scale.

Within the course, there will be a "measured mile".The judges will use their judgment for scale speeds.No points will be awarded if a contestant fails to

3. No points will be awarded if a contestant fails to complete the course, but a second chance will be given.

4. A 2 point penalty will be assessed for each buoy not rounded or hit, and also for hitting another boat.

WOTE: There will be only one main operating event. Because we are trying to "keep it Simple" we will not conduct the specialized events, i.e. predicted log, blind comning, bollard pulls, salvage etc. that we have held in the past. We intend to have fun and relax.
