



TIPS FROM OTHER CLUBS

Bill Ashton of the Northern New Jersev club used Form-a-Line chart tape between the planks for deck caulking, while another member paints the sides of each plank black, while yet another uses a more subtle efect of blackening the sides with a pencil before gluing in place.

Also from Northern New Jersey comes a favorable review of the flexible curve by Keuffel & Esser #572817-30, which reportedly holds a firm shape, not sprining back at you or moving while you draw a line.

FCC Approves AMA Petition For New RC Frequencies!

ON APRIL 1 of this year the Federal Communications Commission approved the Notice of Proposed Rule Making (NPRM) which promised practically all that we asked for in our original petition of November 1978. Then the FCC Commissioners on November 4, by vote of 6-0, officially approved a Report and Order which is essentially the same as the NPRM.

The next step is to implement the AMA plan for gradual transition to the new frequencies. The plan has been carefully worked out to permit the old and new 72 MHz frequencies to co-exist for the next five years. Also, the FCC has authorized more frequencies than can practically be used at this time, with the idea that there will be enough for many years down the road if we use them right. To do that it is first necessary to operate for the next five years according to AMA's new plan, after which a transition will be made to converting our previous 72 MHz frequencies while we add still more new ones.

One important caution: the new FCC rules imply that frequency changing by modelers is possible. That's not quite so. The new FCC rules permit "removing and inserting a plug-in module that is part of a type-accepted RC transmitter," but it does not refer to crystal changing.

Our legal counsel's interpretation is that transmitter frequency changing by crystal swapping alone is only permissible if it involves a unique crystal configuration which is not interchangeable between manufacturers because it is common only to the specific transmitter design which a manufacturer has gotten type-accepted by the FCC. Otherwise, the crystal and other accompanying frequency-determining components must be exchanged in a module form. Regardless, most manufacturers have come up with economical. plans to convert existing equipment to the. new frequencies, for those who don't want to wait five years until that becomes necessary. NEW R/C FREQUENCIES

We are now one year into the new rules for R/C Frequencies. We are reprinting the article sumarizing these new rules on the next two pages. Since we do not reproduce in color, here are the codes:

new can operate compatibly, provided we use common sense.

Note: The new frequencies can use either AM or FM. This should not cause problems since, on any one frequency, at any given time, the operation will be either, not both. Thus compatibility is a matter of frequency (channel) numbers rather than whether AM or FM is in use.

Suggestions: Study the new channel numbers and color codes on the pages which accompany this article. Learn how the new 72 MHz frequencies relate to the old. Get together with other RCers, particularly inclub meetings, and develop new frequency controls (clothespin or other type) for your flying site. Think seriously about frequency monitoring as a means of knowing who is on what frequency.

For the first time we have more legal frequencies than the number of models we can fly safely at a typical club field. Think about that and the need for keeping track of all the possibilities. Adapt to the new situation in your area carefully. Remember that channel numbers refer to new frequencies only.

New AMA RC Identification And Control System Effective January 1, 1983


WITH THE ACQUISITION of new RC frequencies in the 72 and 75 MHz bands, the long-standing system of identifying RC frequencies by colored streamers alone has become outmoded; it is being replaced by a system able to cope with the larger number of now-usable frequencies. A


RC FREQUENCY SYST

...For cars & boats


THE "OLD" 27 Mhz CHANNELS are usable with no restrictions on the type of model controlled. You are permitted to switch crystals to change frequency within this band without re-tuning.



THE "OLD" SHARED FREQUENCIES IN THE 72 Mhz BAND are still usable until January 1988. Since these channels are shared with radio controlled planes, you should change to another channel as soon as you can, to avoid interference to your model and others. After January 1988, these channels will be phased out. Your present equipment will still be usable if re-tuned to another frequency, either in the 27 Mhz band (above) or the 75 Mhz band (below).



THE NEW CHANNELS are designated by a channel number shown on the colored flag. Eleven new channels are now available. Most older radios can be re-tuned to one of these new channels simply and cheaply. The re-tuning must be done by a qualified engineer or the radio manufacturer, New radios should be available on these channels, or be convertible by the manufacturer.



THE NEW FREQUENCY FLAGS carry a number as well as a color code, because the new channels are designated by number. As of now, new channels 62, 64, 66, 68, 70, 74, 76, 78, 80, 82 and 84 are available. The six channels in the 27 Mhz band, designated by their color code, are also usable and will not change. The three frequencies in the 72 Mhz band (blue & white, purple & white, yellow & white) are usable until January 1988, but they should be changed as soon as possible because they are shared with model airplanes. In January 1988, there will be a total of 18 channels (12 new, 6 in the 27 MHz band) for use by surface models; in 1991, there will be a total of 36 channels.

THESE CHANNELS ARE FOR CARS, BOATS, AND OTHER NON-FLYING MODELS ONLY! To prevent interference and loss of control of your model or others' models, please do not use radios on these channels in a model airplane, or a radio on an airplane-only channel in a surface model. If you buy a radio on one of the old 72 Mhz frequencies, it is easy and cheap to convert it to one of the exclusive new channels. Check with your dealer or the radio manufacturer.


