# HEAR STAN HUGILL

# Last Chantyman from THE AGE of SAIL Author of "SONGS of the SEA."

Born in the Old Coastguard Cottage, Hoylake, Cheshire, England, he sailed from the Mersey often enough to appreciate "The Leaving of Liverpool." He came from a sea-going family, both father and grandfather served their time in sail, sang sea songs and wrote them down in a book which eventually came into Stan's possession.


Stan's first ship sailed from Liverpool (it was a steamer) and was shipwrecked off the coast of New Zealand on his first trip, whereupon Stan moved into the world of sail and shanty on board a ship called the "Saucy Kate," which was used for coasting around New Zealand.

The 20's and 30's brought many ships, songs and adventures trading around the Pacific: rounding Cape Horn in the world's largest sailing ship, the German vessel, "Gustav"; shipwrecked a second time when the last British square-rigged four-masted barque, "Garthpool," struck the African coast; sailing around the West Indies on a Bluenose ship and with the National Geographic Society of America seeking the treasure of Morgan, the notorious buccaneer.

In 1936, Stan went back into steam and it was on the Blue Funnel ship "Automedon" that he was taken prisoner off the coast of Sumatra on 11 November 1940. He remained a prisoner of war in Germany until released by the Guards Armoured Division in 1945.

His books, especially that bible of seasong, "Shanties from the Seven Seas," are the result of his research as well as his wide experience of life. Respected and honored throughout the world, Stan Hugill is Merseyside's own living history. We are proud to have him with us today.

### Octopuses kill two island fishermen

WELLINGTON, New Zealand (AP)

— Two fishermen from the Pacific island nation of Kiribati were killed by giant octopuses that held them underwater until they drowned, a newspaper said today.


The New Zealand Herald said the two, armed with spears, were hunting for octopuses when some of the sea creatures caught hold of them and forced them under the water.

Babera Kirata, Kiribati's natural resources minister, was quoted as

saying the octopuses were 3 or 4 yards long, much bigger than those the islanders traditionally kill for food.

Kirata was quoted as saying a fisherman usually hunts by letting an octopus cling to him, then surfacing and killing the creature by biting a nerve between its eyes.

"We are going to have to find another way of killing octopuses," Kirata said.

SHOW AND TELL - PLUS IDEAS!

EILL KELLY-FLEMING - Brigantine NEWSBOY from the kit. Several methods of weathering the copper were tried with the ammonia/vinegar/salt solution method seming to work best, although he has had some problems with large spots not taking the solution very well. Other members offered yet another method: muratic acid available from drugstores or pool supply stores, stopped with water.

ALBERT L'HEUREUX - Viking ship SWIFT DRAGON, scratch built plank on frame. The frame and keel of this 6' long marvel is in process. Albert also let us in on a few of his plans for R/C features.

DOUG MCFARLAND - his HOTSPUR continues along with the main and formast standing rigging set and with the mirren on the way. Doug also taught us the CLINCH KNOT, which is a clove hitch with an overhand knot tied around the bight of the knot.

JOHN MCDERMOTT - Monitor HMS GROGON. A scratch built plank on frame display model in 1/8" = 1'. The 36" long hull is about 50% complete.



Both cruises will include a full buffet luncheon served on board and run approximately five hours, with departure from Fort Mason at 10:00 AM to return about 3:00 PM.


