Our special presentation was a first hand report on the sailing of the STAR OF INDIA. Our Guild was duly represented both in support staff on the dock and aboard the STAR. Dockside, providing security support were Roy Nilson, Fred Fraas, and George Oliver. Meanwhile aboard the STAR were working crew members Bob Wright and Gordon Jones, "special crew" Bill Benson, and museum video-taper Bill Kelly-Fleming. Bob, Gordon, and Bill K-F took turns telling "yarns of the high seas"! They described some of the details the handling rigging, principles involved in sailing a large square-rigger, and anecdotes of the many events of the day. They told of the thrill of seeing all the people lining the shoreline and the large number of escort vessels. While we started out slowly due to the channel being in the lee of Point Loma, we eventually got clipping along at a reported 9 1/2 to 10 knots, and with a light ballast the STAR was heeling quite noticably, in fact we had to start reducing sail. The only manuevering problem encountered was on the second tack when the wind shifted just after the fore yards were braced around, causing us to be caught in irons. Quick action by the captain and the response of the crew, and about 15 minutes of patience got us back on the right tack. All the other tacks were smooth and without flaw, showing the results of the days of practice by the crew. Bob Wright told us that it was a thrill to sail on her this second time, perhaps more so than the first in 1976, because only five months earlier he was able to visit the yard where the then EUTERPE was built in 1863. Gordon cited the high point of the day as being when the wind finally picked and we could feel that the STAR had "got up and stepped out." Bill said he was tempted many times to set down his video equipment and join in hauling on lines. He noted the effects of the extreme list at the end of the

first tack when he almost got caught off balance at the edge of the deck house with his 30 pounds of video equipment and lookind down at the action at the pin rails. This was the second trip on the STAR for both Bob and Gordon, but it was Bill's first. Bill's thrill was finally living out a dream of sailing on such a ship, a dream he has had since he, as a young boy, first saw three tall ships in New London, Conn.

Bill is working on a video project for the museum which concentrates on training to be a crew member of a square rigger. He shared that in the process of taping the training sessions and the sailing, he was able to pick up even more details of the rigging and construction which will be invaluable in his model work. Since this video project is a volunteer effort, it will be many months before it is editied and ready for viewing.

To celebrate the adventures of our sailors, and more so to celebrate <u>Fred</u> Fraas' birthday, we cut a cake with a beautiful image of the STAR OF INDIA on the frosting and we popped the cork on a couple bottles of the bubbly.










No, this is not becoming a railroad magazine...but it is steam.....

RAND CANYON RAILROAD: In the spring of 1985 you'll be able to do something no one's done for twenty years—take a train ride to the Grand Canyon. Pulled by an antique steam engine, you'll travel through lush pine forests and high plateau country on the same narrow-gage track that carried thousands of the Canvon's first visitors from Williams, on Interstate 40, to the Canyon's South Rim. The historic sixty-three-milelong line, operated by the Santa Fe Railroad from the turn of the century to the mid-1950s, shut down due to falling profits. But last year, Railroad Resources Incorporated of Phoenix bought the track, and in conjunction with Del Webb Corporation's Recreational Properties Division will feature daily train travel to the Canyon. Other vessels had been retrofitted to carry airplanes, but the *Ranger* was America's first ship designed as an aircraft carrier. She carried 126 planes and had a 765-ft. flight deck. The *Ranger* could cut through the water at a fast 28 knots.

SHIPCRAFT GUILD OF NEW YORK



• THE NAVY is studying proposals for a radically redesigned nuclear-powered attack submarine that will run faster, deeper and quieter than any ever built by a Western power. The SSN-21 would carry twice as many weapons as today's attack submarines with an unspecifled arsenal of torpedoes, mines and nuclear missiles, senior Navy officials told The Day newspaper of New London, Conn. Each of the first four of the new subs is projected to cost \$1.6 billion and the rest, \$1 billion each. They would replace the Navy's \$800 million attack submarine, the nuclear-powered 688 - or Los Angeles - class. By contrast, each of the Navy's Trident nuclear missile-firing submarines costs \$1.2 billion.

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
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
