Two well known research vessels have been in port recently. Cousteau's new turbo windship ALCYONE was here for a few days while studying blue sharks off the coast. More recently, ATLANTIS II, the Woods Hole Oceanographic mother ship to the Deep Submergence Vehicle ALVIN, was in port. She will return and be at Campbell's yard from December 19 to January 6. One of her more recent projects was the TITANIC expedition featured in the current NATIONAL GEOGRAPHIC and an upcoming TV special. Of interest to modelers is that ALVIN's pilot used a printed cardboard model of the TITANIC in planning the dives. It is the same as the one I have been building, which some of you

have seen. Currently, I have my cardboard model at the model shop.

The current issue of the Museum's MAINSAIL HAUL has an excellect article by Doc Stern on our "votive" model and our problems in determining its age.

An interesting twist has shown up in the model shop. Ed White is restoring a Chinese junk donated to the Museum. I have just taken a restoration contract for another junk. It appears both were built by the same man near Shanghai in the mid-1930's. He lived near a military base and several of these models have shown up in this area and in Texas.

OLD BUSINESS:

Following up on last month's discussion about the model shop, Bob Crawford announced a museum sponsored show between our April and May meetings. The exhibition will inclide a seminar for movice modelers, and attendees showed a favorable response. In alternate years there would be a day-long gathering with workshops, seminars, displays, and similar educational activities.

NEW BUSINESS:

Announcement was made of a new electronics swap meet held at the Santee Drive-In. The Model Yacht Pond was the focus of several items. The first was regarding common courtesy in using and sharing frequencies. (See courtesy list elsewhere.) Recently an out of town visitor had three R/C boats stolen from his local campsite. One lesson—have good close—up photos of you boat and use a good identifying mark somewhere visible inside the hull.

Nominations were taken for 1987 officers. (The Logkeeper swears he heard a train whistle blowing in the background.) Nominated were Bill Kelly-Fleming for Master and Doug McFarland as Mate. Still needed are a Clerk or Asst. Logkeeper to take our log at meetings and a purser. Herman can continue as purser but he will be out of town a lot of the time this year.

PRESENATIONS:

<u>George Barber</u> is a photographer of Navy ships and shared about his collection and work. He is a good local source for Navy ship photos for modeling purposes.

Albert L'Heureux shared set-ups for photoetchings of parts for his model of PACIFIC PRINCESS. Among his needs are 90' of railings for this 7'3", 160 lb model. Al has a technical drawing background that was put to good use in setting up his masters. He showed examples in all the stages of the set-up for the photoetching process, which will be arranged through Loren Parry. A brief summary is as follows:

- 1. Enlarge the original drawing.
- 2. Draw the master with a technical pen or line tape.
- Reduce to size desired.

(Note: Reducing is cheaper than enlarging.)

- 4. Make reversal.
- 5. Make Negative.

For a full description see article in FINE SCALE MODELER. Does anyone know of a local company for photoetching up to 12"x24"?

Roy Nilson and Doug McFarland demonstrated techniques for planking hulls, Roy for R/C and Doug on traditional methods for static models. For large R/C hulls, Roy gave this process:

- 1. Use door thin material for planks.
- 2. Glue with Elmer's Woodworking Glue.
- 3. Seal gaps and dips with Bondo.
- 4. Sand.
- 5. Slosh around resin inside the hull.
- 6. Seal/paint outside of hull.

SHOW AND TELL

- Vic Crosby -- USCGC EAGLE in a pinch bottle, :Liquor was good but I was sober at the time I built it."
- Ken Nurmi -- Cross section of USS CONSTITUTION from a kit, 40% complete. Made of walnut and basswood. "For authenticity, some details must be added."
 - -- New Bedford whale boat in 1/36 scale from kit. This nicely finished planked model is from basswood and birch. Original vessels were built predominately in New England by 6 well known builders in the 1830 1900 era.
- Bob Crawford -- USS MADDOX (DD 731) scratch built in 1/32"=1' scale, from poplar. The MADDOX formally started Viet Nam as a result of the Gulf of Tonkin incident. "Small scale, big hurry."
- Jay McMaster -- Galleon SAN FILIPE in 1:78 scale from kit, about half done, currently finishing cannon rigging.
- Doug McFarland -- Fictional sloop of war HOTSPUR. Is working on ratlines, he found ‡" graph paper makes an excellent backing pattern for spacing.
- Al L'Heureux -- Lifeboats for PACIFIC PRINCESS modeled from fiberglass and styrene.
- Rick Medley -- Baltimore Clipper LYNX in 1:62 scale from a kit in walnut, basswood, and limewood. This POF display model is now 25% complete. Launched in 1812, the LYNX was 94' on deck and while rated at 14 guns, she carried only 8. "PANART KIT, main problem is poor rigging plan:"

These channels are usable $\underline{\text{UNTIL JANUARY 1988}}$. After that time they can only be used for planes.

SHARED FREQUENCIES - 27 Mhz Band

26.995 Brown

27.045 Red

27.095 Orange

27.145 Yellow

27.195 Green

27.225 Blue

NEW FREQUENCIES - 75 Mhz Band

75.430 - 62 BLUE/RED

LOGKEEPER'S NOTE:


I noticed that one of the clubs from which we receive a newsletter has an officer with whom members register their frequencies to help in selecting a channel and similar concerns.

- · Use color flags on antenna of your transmitter.
- Check to make sure no one in operating on your frequency before turning on transmitter.
- Get to know who shares your frequency so that running can be coordinated.
- Don't hog the frequency.
- Observe normal "Rules of the Road."

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

SHOP NOTES

HOME MADE MODELING AIDS

A good model may depend on how cheap your tools are. The cheap tools I am talking about are the scraps lying around your shop, on the clothesline, in your wife's hair, her sewing box, and in the dining room drawer. I will talk about a few that I use. Maybe you have the same or others which may be of use to our members.

AROUND THE SHOP. Never glue a joint and leave glue squeezing out. Before it hardens, scrape it off. A rag only smoothes it out. One of my weapons is the common stick. I usually bevel the edge to suit the job. A second method is to make scrapers out of nails, pieces of wire, scrap metal, or broken glass. These are used to get to hard corners. Bend the wire to suit the need.



Another good device is a boring jig. When you want to drill a hole in a deck, especially if painted, you may get a bad start with the drill if it is a high speed tool. Get a block of wood, drill holes and you have a jig for the job.

See Figure 1 for these gadgets.

IN YOUR WIFE'S HAIR. There are about 1000 different types of hair clips which can be used as small clamps for model work. The good thing about these are that they can be readily bent to suit the job. Figure 2 shows an example.



IN THE MENDING BOX. The needle is number one on the list for rigging. The heads can be filed out to form hooks and pushsticks. A small needle filed out for a hook is invaluable for making eye splices in small line. Push the needle through the line and grab an end and pull back. The head is small and when the hook has a line in it, it




IN THE DINING ROOM DRAWER. Toothpicks have many uses. One that I use is as a dowel for aligning deck house and other furniture on the deck. For the tapered round toothpicks, I cut off a portion of the tapered end

and use it to glue into the deck hole. One of these ends fits nicely in about 2 3/22" hole. See Figure 4.

ON THE CLOTHESLINE. The old clothespin is nothing new. A thin piece of wood nailed on the end makes a wonderful holder for small blocks (thanks to




Merritt Edson). When soldering dead eye strops to chain plates, the end of the pin can be filed to fit the strop and hold the work in place. And of course the clothespin is a great clamp. Shape the head to the job you are doing. See Figure 5. (Ben Lankford)
