

Masts Ho! Three hundred yards off my apartment - two tall sticks, sir! As I write this, over in Kettenburg yard the PILGRIM OF NEWPORT sits out of the water. Although I've heard of her, I have no details on her. A schooner rig, her hull and rig are like that of an early Baltimore clipper or of an 1830's slaver. I make her to be around 70'-80' on deck, and both masts carry topmasts for an impressive height. She still might be in the yard by the time you get this, especially if you pick up the newsletter at the Pond. I would be worth stopping by at the foot of Dickens Street.

Although the repostioning season is nearly over for cruise ships the former Italian liner converted to a mission ship, the ANASTASIS will be at Broadway Pier again October 18-November 1.

She will be open for tours on Saturdays for 10 am to 5 pm and on Sundays from 1 pm to 5 pm for an admission donation of \$2.

The Wood's Hole research vessel ATLANTIS II with the submersible ALVIN is due in San Diego October 24-26, and November 8- 20 prior to her usual yard maintenance here in December.

LOG OF THE SEPTEMBER MEETING

(as reconstructed by the Guild Master from his notes)


Thirty-one were present once everyone had arrived (in spite of Tom Lai's being closed some members were still late arriving). After a few brief announcements a prolonged discussion took place concerning judging criteria at regattas and shows. This matter became a suggested topic cor the proposed West Coast Modeler's Conference in January or February 1989. There appears to be strong support for hosting this conference, although your master was nearly trampled in the stanpeed of volunteers to serve on a steering committee.

Two models were brought for SHOW-AND-TELL (at least according to my recordS):

<u>DOUG MCFARLAND</u> is now up to "89% complete" on his HOTSPUR; "Ratlines completed, and 'yarding' to commence forthwith."

Visitor <u>BLAINE LAMBERT</u> brought a beautiful model of the GRIDLEY (DLG-21) in 1:96 scale that is R/C and scratch built. This is the third GRIDLEY in Navy history, built in 1961 by Puget Sound Bridge & Drydock, Co. She was commissioned in 1963, displaces 7400 tons, is 533' long with a beam of 55' and draught of 26'. Her official speed is 30+ knots. She cares a complement of 373 officers and men. Blaine used many photos for the Navy to overcome bad plans. An operational problem of wide turns was solved by using two of Doug McFarland's speed controls.





SEPTEMBER'S PROGRAM

Dave Brierly, Curator of the Maritime Museum, gave an excellent presentation, with slides, on how a maritime museum looks at ship models.

Among Dave's main points

- 1. A museum must first consider the scope and purpose of its collection and then special considerations. For instance, Mystic is focused primarily on the 1850–1900 period.
- 2. Exceptions to period, scope, etc. would be models considered "folkart," that is having a first person association like a sailor made model, or being made of certain materials like bone models.
- 3. The museum then consideres the quality of the model beginning with its <u>overall impression</u>. Things that may be seriously considered are detail, relevance, types of materials used (especially in terms of durability and resemblence to original materials), color scheme, straight waterlines, and available documentation. In some cases a specific scale may be desired.
- 4. In restorations, the museum looks for representation of the original, accuracy, and attemtion to detail.

Thanks to Dave, it was very informative.

MODEL SHOP NEWS



HANDY HINTS & SHOP AIDS

The following sketch has been submitted and can be built very quickly and easily. To use, one simply stands the plank to be tapered upright next to the slider and pushes the slider to the right to lock the plank in place. Then with a small plane it is a few quick strokes to taper the plank.
