On 8 May 1660, Prince Charles was still in exile at Breda in Holland when he heard that he had been proclaimed King of England, and no sooner had the Dutch Government been made aware of this information than they put a number of vessels at his command. Adrian Vlackett, writing in 1660 said:

The yacht on board the King sailed had been built for himself by the Prince of Orange, but now belongs to the Board of Admiralty of Rotterdam, and it was without doubt the finest of the little fleet, which consisted, without other ships, almost countless, of thirteen large yachts, which the persons of rank use in the rivers and on the sea, to pass from one province to another, for necessity as well as for pleasure.

Later that month, arriving at Delft, the King was rowed from Scheveningen to join the warship Naseby, which, renamed in deference the Royal Charles, then carried him home across the Channel. Vlackett continues: ... 'The King had found his yacht so convenient and comfortable, that he remarked, while discoursing with the deputies, that he might order one of the same style, so soon as she would arrive in England.' Mindful of his fatherland, the burgermaster of Amsterdam, knowing of a yacht of similar size but

not yet fitted out, offered her to the King, who 'did not absolutely accept it, but at the same time did not refuse.' And so the Board of Admiralty at Rotterdam 'had the interior of the cabins decorated and gilded, while some of the best artists have been engaged in making beautiful paintings and sculptures with which to embellish it within and without'.

The Mary, as the King named her, was 66ft (20m) in overall length, 19ft (5.8m) in the beam, 10ft (3m) in draught and of 100 tons burden. She carried eight guns and a complement of between twenty and thirty men. Rigged with a sprit mainsail and staysail, she was equipped with the customary Dutch leeboards and her circular gun ports were surrounded by wreaths of gold. The King was delighted and in truth could not wait to take delivery, on 15 August 1660, Samuel Pepys entering in his diary: 'To the office, and after dinner to White Hall, where I found the King gone this morning by 5 of the clock to see a Dutch pleasure-boat below the bridge.' This is the only known authentic account of the arrival of the Mary in England, and later Pepys leaves us in no doubt that the King was most thrilled with her and was soon sailing her extensively, sometimes taking her helm and with an escort of warships visiting places along the Kentish coast.

During his reign some twenty-eight yachts were launched from the royal dockyards for the King and his brother, later to become James II, including a second yacht Mary, built to the original boat's plans. You of these vessels were designed by Phineas and topher Pett, who were descended from a family famous for building ships from the time of Henry VIII, and various attempts were made to improve their stability and speed, but without any dramatic effect. Some interesting costs of building the Duke of York's Anne, an eight gunner, almost identical to the Dutch Mary, were:

And for a mariner's pay - just 11/2 pence per day.

It was the Anne and another new yacht, the King's Katherine, named after the lady he was to marry in the following year, which in 1661 were the first yachts known to have been involved in a race, with the Merry Monarch, as he came to be called, winning the then handsome wager of £100.

But as new yachts were built the Mary soon drifted into disfavour, and having been sent to the Irish station, her crew begged the Navy Commissioners, 'that their families may not be starved in the streets, and themselves go like heathen, having nothing to cover their nakedness, being owed 52 weeks pay.' To seamen in the seventeenth century Navy it was often the case, but for the Mary it was the beginning of the end. Sadly she rotted away with neglect, sinking off Holyhead in 1675, where she was found by divers in 1973, fortunately being left to rest in the peaceful grave she most certainly deserved.
