



SAN DIEGO SHIP MODELERS GUILD STEERING COMMITTEE NOTES MARCH 18, 1993

- 1. Attendance: Present were: White, LePage, Cornell, Crawford, McFarland, Fraas, O'Brien, Fluck and Briese.
- 2. Election ballots received to date were tallied by John Fluck. to be reported at the general meeting.
- 3. Cornell reported that we have been approached by a R. Richards who is coordinating a massive program to be held May 15. It is to be known as "CELEBRATE THE BAY" and the objective is to raise money to help support Mission Bay maintenance and improvement in the face of city budget deficits. The Parks Management is urging all users of the Bay facilities (including the Guild and the Argonauts) to participate in this effort. The Committee concurred in this so the originally planned R/C/Festival will be moved to the May 15th date.

A Committee to coordinate the style, program and other aspects of the event should be set up soon. Inasmuch as we had held a similar event several years in the past should make arrangements easy.

- 4. Dan LePage held a meeting to start planning for the June Regatta. He is sorely in need of help and was urged to appoint appropriate members rather than hope for volunteers.
- 5. The size (cost) and content of the Guild's News Letter recerved discussion and constructive comments. It was agreed that a one-stamp limit be viewed with discretion. i.e.:if important items would put an occasional NL over the 29 cent limit, so be it. Members reaction to the NL has been very favorable.
- 6. The April meeting program involves the San Diego Argonauts attending to help the Guild members have a better appreciation of the structure and activities of their "cousin" organization. Bob Cornell will handle these arrangements.



It was designed by Mr. Allen of the City Engineering Department around 1947 for the purpose of model yachting. There was a lot of support for this from Mr. George Jessop and other prominent citizens of San Diego. The model boat pond was to be modeled like the Pond in Central Park, N.Y., the Spreckels Lake Pond area in San Francisco and the Round Pond in London. The pond has been used by such noted personalities as Walt Disney and Al Wood to name a couple and for the testing of various special effects models ie. "Tora, Tora" and other such films.

Usage of the Model Yacht Pond has been extremely popular and in 1974 the City created a tree ringed, grassy area where families can picnic and watch the model's operate in the pond.

Well here is another year and another regatta is coming up. The regatta will be the 19th and 20th June and I am now soliciting inputs for the regatta and volunteers. MOLDING PLASTIC PARTS

The Dave Manley Way

A few months ago Dave Manley showed us how he casts all his parts for his models. Here is a step by step presentation of his method. Dave says that if this does not work the first time, do not dispare, try again. Some times the parts will not come out right for various reasons. All of his SAN DIEGO was made using this process.

TO DO THIS YOU WILL NEED:

A prototype of the part desired.

Vaseline or similar petroleum jelly.

Silicone rubber used for sealing bathtubs, it comes in tubes and can be used with a gun designed for use in such purposes. The clear kind is best to use.

Casting or laminating resin. Finishing resin doesn't work as well.

A piece of paper or cardboard to set the mold on.

STEP 1:

Obtain the prototype, either from an original part to be copied, or make it yourself.

STEP 2:

Put the prototype on a sheet of paper with the side not wanted down against < the paper. A box could be built up around the part.




STEP 3:

Cover the prototype with Vaseline or similar substance to prevent adhersion to the mold.

STEP L:

Smear silicone rubber all around the prototype part, totally covering the part.



STEP 5

Let the rubber dry. The thicker the coat, the longer it takes. A coat of 1/8" usually takes 5 days.

STEP 6:

Once dry, pop out the prototype. You now have the mold.

STEP 7:

Prepare the resin. If strength is desired, add fiberglass cloth or strands into the mold before pouring in the resin.

STEP 8:

Pour the resin into the mold. No vaseline is needed in this part of the process.

STEP 9:

Let dry. This will normally take about three hours.

STEP 10:

Pop out the part and finish off as needed.

SIZING WOOD STRIPS by Bob Cornell

Ineptitude is the Mother of desperation! With limited experience in building wood models requiring strips of wood that must be uniform in thickness I was making a mess of a strip decking job. The same would be true of planking. I reasoned, in my agony, that if those darn pieces were steel or brass I would simply mill or surface grind them to whatever thickness was needed. But with wood; no way!

"Mother" peeked in the door. Dummy, she quipped in her usual superior tone, grind them to size with a drum sander! All you need is block of hardwood with a corner sawed out! This, I clamped to the drill press table close to a 2" diameter sanding drum. By adjusting the gap between the drum and the backing block I could sand the oversize strip to thickness, holding a tolerance of no more than + or -.002"! If I removed more than about 1/64" of material it required a second pass to get the desired dimension. The rough strips were pushed, then pulled through the "throat" at about 2 inches per second. An 80 grit drum gave me the finish I wanted for gluing. A drum of, say, 120 grit produced a very smooth surface.

In the Shop Notes section:

I recently refurbished a container ship model in 1:100 scale for MAERSK Ship Lines. Two tips emerged.


ONE- Beware of using lacquer as an overcoat. Although this model was built as recently as 1985, and was kept well protected in a case away from sunlight, the overhead fluorescent lights had badly yellowed exposed surfaces. The bright light blue was a putrid blue-green, and and the containers looked like they had been near a fire. While much of the freeboard area lacquer chipped off nicely with fresh X-acto blades, the lacquer had bonded with the metalic paint on the containers. TIP: avoid lacquers unless you know they will remain clear, and keep models out of fluorescent light.

TWO- The latter problem presented a challenge. All the containers were marked with the old "MAERSK" lettering and were originally applied by the German builder by spray paint and a stencil. I could not preserve the original lettering the lacquer problem was so bad. However, I lucked out! Proto-Power/A-Line in Irvine, CA, specializes in container train models in HO scale, including a full line of decals for containers. Among the lines they carry is MAERSK in both the old and new formats. The old style proved to be an exact match to what was on the model. It took ten sets of decals to do the whole starboard side of the model, but was my tail saved! Anyone who works on a containership in anything near HO scale should check them out. I wouldn't be surpirzed if Whistle Stop in Hillcrest doesn't carry some of the A-Line stock. They even make containers in 20', 40', 45' and 48' sizes.

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

N.S. SAVANNAH Overall Model Length 37=", scale 1/16" = 1'

SAVANNAH was built as an experimental nuclear powered vessel for the U.S. Maritime Administration. She was a prototype of the ship of the future, capable of journeying around the globe several times without refueling. She is now berthed in Charleston, SC and is open to the general public. This kit is a departure from the normal in that both the hull and superstructure are pre-carved, and most all deck structures are already cast in final shape.
