

ELECTION RESULTS:







REMEMBERING LEW HARMELING:

We were saddened to learn of Lew Harmeling's death last month. Prior to moving from La Jolla to San Marcos several years ago, Lew was a very active guild member. A few weeks ago, Mrs. Harmeling contacted Doug McFarland and arranged a donation of books and Moto tools for our model shop. It was in Aug. 1982, Lew was our "Modeler of the Month." In his memory, these articles are reprinted.

August Modeler of the Month

Most modelers work on replicas that are some fractional scale of an actual vessel. Once in a while there comes along someone who prefers to be inventive, to create a scale replica from visual observations only, or to build a full scale replica of a certain type of boat. In our Guild we have one modeler who combines all three of these elements. Another of our transplants from Seattle, our August Modeler of the Month is Lew Harmeling.

Lew has had a strong interest in boats since he was a young boy. Both of his grandfathers were involved with boats, and one of them built quite a number of them. Launches and hollowed out canoes were prominent in Lew's early experience, and one of the first things he carved when given a pocket knife by his grandfather was a crude hull with a stick mast and paper sail. He lost his dad when he was 10 which meant some hard economic times. A neighbor had a toy steam boat which inspired Lew to build one out of materials he could scrounge up, including a hypodermic needle canister for a piston and a bicycle spoke for a shaft.

Lew has made model furniture, liked to sculpt, and has fiddled with carving. His interest in working on full scale boats goes back to when he was 13 or 14 when he helped to build boats and canoes in a basement. At one time he helped his brother-in-law build an 18' centerboard sloop. Several years ago, in order to protect an idea he had for a catamaran using modified dory hulls, he created a business called the "Double Dory Boat Works". Since he is an upolsterer, he had some interesting moments when the Franchise Tax Board came around to check his "Boat Works."

Lew's favorite model is his steam tug "Duke", modeled after a tug he saw in Solano Beach. While working on that model, he went down to the pond and met several of the guys. It was at that time he decided to put a live steam engine in his tug. As for the ship's electronics, he says that aspect leaves him cold. He also finds the challenge and excitement in doing a project, rather than in the completed boat. His dory was the project he had the most fun with, but now he is ready to sell that to make room for his pram.

Lew has a little shop back near the alley at his home, stocked with tools, many of which he got when he bought a whole garage full of used tools for \$200.00.

We in the Guild have found Lew eager to help others with a problem, and helpful in tips on how real boats are built. We salute Lew Harmeling as our modeler of the month.

On Saturday September 11, the Model Guild will be guests of the San Diego Maritime Museum aboard the 1904 steam yacht MEDEA for an afternoon cruise. This will be open initially to each guild member and a quest on a first come first serve basis. As a gesture toward the Museum, the Guild will donate \$1,000, so we are asking \$25.00 a head donation to the guild treasury. See Ed White to reserve.

Finally, I regret to inform everyone, but we may have a thief in the model shop aboard the BERKELEY. APRIL 15, MEETING NOTES

The San Diego Argonauts R/C Model Boat Club was invited to provide the meeting's principle program. Its objective was to help the Guild folks to get a better understanding of how the Argonauts operate and how they differ from the Guild.

Bob Crawford, Guild Master, introduced Argonauts Commodore Larry Knudsen who provided hand-outs that gave a general picture of the "sister" club. The Argonauts club provides competitive racing for both sail and power boats. Larry noted that the club has a Constitution to guide its activities and three treasuries. In addition to several Life and Honorary members there are about 115 total paid-up members, about equally divided between Sail and Power.

Mike Veta, Vice Commodore-Power, described the various classes of boats being actively raced in San Diego. Engine size and hull type determines the "class" designation. In addition to monthly local Club Championship races many members travel to invitational meets at other Southwestern California sites. Power boat racing is governed by a national "umbrella" organization known as the North American Model Boat Association which provides liability insurance coverage for the members. Once every year NAMBA conducts a big international championship meet in which a number of Argonauts travel to compete against 600-700 boats to bring back a fair share of the trophies.

Vice Commodore, Sail, Pete Jefferson was next on the "menu". He described the various classes of racing sail boats that are active here. Some are "formula" boats and some are one design. The latter must be identical in hull shape and sail plan. Thus it is the skipper's sailing ability and boat trimming that counts. Pete pointed out that, in contrast to the replicas that Guild members might build, sail boats are basically miniature craft, not modeled after a full sized yacht. Like the Power Division's club races, the Sail members race once each month for annual championship points. The best year's scorers receive trophies at an annual banquet for all club members just as do the Power Div. skippers.

Secretary Larry Lyons described his duties which include keeping a data base of members from which a semi annual roster is prepared. His most appreciated job is the editing and publishing a club News Letter. Larry is well aware of its importance in keeping members informed of recent activities and coming events.

Treasurer Bob Cornell admitted to a tight fisted approach to his job. He maintains three bank accounts designated to the finances of the Club. the Sail Division and the Power Division. Club Dues pay for the news letter and any other expenses that are for the benefit of all members. Sail a Power Division income and expenses are kept separate. He reported that all accounts are healthy.

The Show 'n Tell session was largely provided by several of the Argonauts describing their power craft and the challenges of keeping them running at top performance. It was evident that this is a hobby for good mechanics. Many questions by the Guild members centered on the speed of the boats and the power of their engines.

In other business, John Fluck reported that the run-off ballot was close but Bob Crawford was elected Master and Jim Hawkins, First Mate for the year. Also, Bob Crawford reported that he might be able to arrange a cruise next summer on the steam yacht MEDEA. This would be promarily for the Guild members with any openings available for Argonauts members. The required \$1000. "charter" fee could be met by a cruise ticket price of \$25. per person. A buffet lunch wopuld be provided. More on this as Bob Develops the details.

Treasurer Ed White reported a balance of \$/redacted/. The Program for May is Fiber Glassing and for June: Air Brushing. Dan LePage has plans for the June Regatta in hand but he will need many volunteers. Bob Cornell will make the hardware for the drum-style planking strip sizing equipment.





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A PLAN TO RECOGNIZE CLUB SERVICE

INTRODUCTION: Members of the SDSMG recently learned of a plan (used by a club in Ohio) that made good use of a system of service awards. These were akin to earning credits that were "spent" at the club's annual affair such as a banquet. The member could use his award points to bid for some prize. He would be competing in the auction against other "brownie point" recipients.

The member could earn points by service in such things as:

- 1. Servings as an officer
- 2. Helping to run a regatta or other event,
 - 3. Manning the model shop.
 - 4. Initiating and carrying out a special project.
 - 5. Recruiting new members.
 - 6. And any number of other contributions to the club's welfare.

The prizes or items that would be auctioned off might be bought by the club or donated by manufacturers or hobby shops. During the year the points scores or standings of the leaders might be published periodically, just like baseball scores. The big challenge will be to equitably set up a schedule of points for the various services performed. The point system should be such that an outstanding worker could end the year with, perhaps, 5000 points or credits. No money would permitted to be used in the bidding. The only "coin of the realm" would be points/credits.

In the case of the San Diego Ship Modelers Guild the possible services and their "brownie points" earnings might be:

RADIO on Shore Runs Model Yacht

Signals Steer Seven-Font Craft on

The hamsman of this seven-and-one-half-foot miniature sailing craft was some distance away on the shore of the lake. A radio ransmitting key was the link between his hand and the steering mechanism of the boat, the latter being remotely controlled by impulses from a small amateur radio transmitter.

The radio-controlled model yacht Allita was built by two boys, David Bammes and Homer Howard, members of the Pamona Model Yacht Club, under the direction of Herman How-

ard, sponsor of the club.

As the photographs show, the Allia is a fine job of model building. Having a beam of fourteen inches and also a fourteen-inchedrait, she has ample "cargo" capacity to take care of the weight of the three-tube battery operated radio receiving set and the radio-controlled ruider mechanism.

Both the transmitter on shore and the receiver in the yacht follow conventional imateur radio practice. A sensitive, high-resistance relay takes the place of the usual headphones in the receiving circuit. When this relay closes in response to a radio siznal, it illows current to operate a magnet which moves the pawl of a circular-disk ratchet switch. The contacts in this switch close the circuit to a louble solenoid, the armature of which is attached to the end of the tiller. Every other con-

tact is "neutral," and the remaining contacts alternately throw the rudder to starboard and port.

Assuming that the switch is resting on a neutral contact, the boat will sail straight ahead till the helmsman on shore sends a dash. This will throw the rudder to one side

or the other, depending on which operating contact comes next on the ratchet disk switch. If the contact happens to throw the rudder in the right direction, the operator allows the boat to turn as far as desired and then sends another dash to return the switch to the neutral position. If the rudder is turned in the wrong direction, two dashes sent in quick

succession immediately turn the rudder to the position desired.

The picture diagram shows the arrangement of the rudder-operating mechanism. It would, of course, not be practical to apply radio control to a model boat of smaller size because of the weight of batteries necessary to operate the radio receiving circuit and the relays.

The home construction of the parts that operate the rudder when signals are received by the set on the boat should present no difficulty to the radio and electrical experimenter. The transformer connected between the radio receiver and the first relay should be of the step-lown type such as is used to couple the plate circuit of a power tube to the voice coil of a dynamic peaker. The first relay will then operate on low voltage current. This method is satisfactory if the transmitting wave is interrupted at relatively low frequency.

RC Padio History Facts!

I was doing some reading and ran across some interesting historic facts on RC Radio. In 1899, Nikola Tesla, (Inventor of Alternating Current Electric Motor), demonstrated a radio control system in a model boat. In the 1910 and 1920's the Navy and Army experimented with radio control for miniature and full size aircraft. Model builders in the 30's like Walter & William Good. Ed Lorentz, & Howard McEntee were developing RC aircraft that could be built and flown by the hobbyists. The 1940's & 1950's saw the hobby grow slowly, which was due to the shortage of suitable components and the FCC's insistence that RC modelers be licensed amateur radio operators. Then the FCC authorized the use of several Citizen Band Radio frequencies, which were examination free, but growth was still slow because of the expensive, bulky, and unreliable equipment of the time.

The 1960's saw radical changes because of transistors and printed circuits. Receivers designs changed from superregenerative to superheterodyne, which had better selectivity, the transmitter also used less power. By the 1970's integrated circuits began to replace discrete components, bringing improved reliability.

The 1970's saw the entrance of digital proportional radics's. The 1980's saw the entrance of FM narrow band, computer controlled radio's. Where to next only time will tell.



SAN DIEGO BAY WORKBOATS AND SERVICE VESSELS

A "workhoat" is defined as a vessel that performs a task for a fee as a ferry, tug, dredge, and the like, whereas "service" vessels are construed to be, as a rule, government vessels engaged in the common good (see Table 3, "A Preliminary List...1992"). The dividing line is not always distinct. Vessels—for—hire perform a multitude of chores needed in the development and mainten—ance of a harbor and its adjacent coasts. San Diego's commercial fleet was already well—organized by the turn—of—the—century. At that time "Ultisimma" and "Butcher Boy"—together with their larger sisters working the coasts of Lower California and north to what is now called Avila—composed a cloud of sail hauling firewood, salt, eel grass, and such marine products of commerce up and down San Diego Bay. Along the shore there was a host of lesser bottoms...dredges, pile drivers, scows, and others...most un—named or un—numbered which have never appear—ed on any printed page.

Photographs from the 1900-20 era are relatively common (those of earlier years are hard to come by) and portray such craft as "Silver Gate", "Hercules", "Santa Fe", and "Bill Kettner". Plans of most are missing altogether; some may yet be culled from obscure files, but that hope continues to fade daily. A rare exception were the two sets of plans drawn by Jerry MacMullen for the ferries "Ramona" and "Siver Gate" as part of the local historical studeies begun in the 1910s by members of the San Diego Maritime Research Society but which languished. Perhaps a dozen photographic images are extant of the San Diego Fire Department-built "Bill Kettner", however, hull lines and deck plan layouts will not likely ever be seen, although the building specifications (recently found) allude to them.






