





THE FORM AND LIGES



Model Boaters and spectators frequently inquire about how the water level in the pond is maintained. Such questions are most common when the water level appears to be below "normai". It takes high tides, over which we have no control, to fill the pond by way of a large one-way valve. In tidal language, the optimum level of the pond is 5.5 feet. There fore, only when the bay tide is above the current pond level will water flow in. In between the high tides when the bay is at low tide the water filters back to the bay through the sand. The water level difference can be as much as seven.

Until several years ago the pond water level was controlled by way of manually operated gate-type valve. This method required that a volunteer, usually a retiree, spend several hours to open and close the valve during periods of high tides. These filling times were often late at night. As the environment in the parks became less hospitable the City agreed that we would be well advised to go to an automatic filling system. Thus, the check valve was installed to replace the gate valve. Discussions are under way with the Parks Department Maintenance Management to establish a Preventative Maintenance Program for the valve Only in this way can the valve be kept "healthy".

MAGASINE storage a problem ?

Corrugated box material and wood strips is all you need to make a neat looking book holder for your ship model magazines. I docorate the spine with wood grained or colored contact shelf paper. The name can be xeroxed on Avery labels or silkscreened, then placed on spine. low your magazines in these holders will look like an expensive set of volumes.




A. WIOTH OF G MAGAZINES OR I YEAR



WESTERN SHIP MODEL CONFERENCE AND EXHIBIT

The first WESTERN SHIP MODEL CONFERENCE AND EXHIBIT will be held on-board the R.M.S. Queen Mary at Long Beach, California on March 25, 26, and 27, 1994. The conference is being hosted by the Ship Modelers Association.

The conference will begin with a reception on Friday evening, March 25, in the Queen Mary Exhibition Hall, where static displays of period and modern ship models, as well as scale radio control ship models can be viewed. Participants are invited to show their models during the conference. Models are requested to arrive any time on Thursday, March 24, but will also be accepted on Friday.

Prominent speakers will address various subjects of interest to model makers and maritime enthusiasts on Saturday, March 26. That evening, there will be a banquet dinner in the Queen Salon. Informal round table discussions will be held on Sunday.

Vendors of books, supplies, and tools will be present all three days to show, discuss, and sell their products.

Participants and their families will have the opportunity of staying on-board the Queen Mary at reduced rates for up to three days before and three days after the conference. The rooms are the original first class state rooms which are largely unchanged except for modernized plumbing. Outside activities such as trips to Disneyland, Knott's Berry Farm, and other points of interest will be available to families. Additional details will be found in the information packet.


