### November Meeting Notes

1. Steering Committee Meeting Items:

January. A report from this committee will be expected and presented

written ballots will be accepted in addition to balloting at the meeting.

### MEETING NOTES

Bob Crawford called the meeting to order at about 19:15 hours. (how nautical do you want it?) Only thirteen members and guests were present. The quality of the attendance was tops!

- 1. It was agreed to spend about \$20-\$30 for our own coffee maker. In that way we can have a clean one and always know where to find it. A schedule of "coffee chefs" will be posted. The idea is to have one person each month be in charge of ensuring the coffee is hot and palatable. Then he can clean out the pot and lock it up for the next chef.
- 2. A \$50 max expenditure for a lighting system for the "Model of the Month" display case was approved.
- 3. It was decided to have the December Christmas Party on the Star, a catered affair. Ham and turkey were chosen as the meat items. The caterer will donate a cake for the occasion. The clubs' spirits cache will be (OK, Doug?) present as well as ice (Right, Doug?)
- A \$5.00 contribution per person will be expected to help defray costs.
- 4. Jim Hawkins reported on the joint pond scheduling meeting with the Argonauts. The schedule may still be subject to minor revisions based on input from some other clubs. An offshoot Guild-like group has approached the Argonauts for some pond time. It is expected that this can be accommodated without much fanfare.
- 5. Purser Ed White reported that the net treasury balance is \$/redacted/.(see itern #6)
- 6. A number of fractional horse power electric motors have been donated to the Guild by Mrs. Lew Harmeling, in memory of her late husband. These and the unused jeweler's lathe that was given to the Guild a year or so ago by Phil Mattson (since replaced by the Sherline lathe and mill) were auctioned off. They brought a total of \$58.00 to our treasury.
- 7. Bob Cunningham has recently retired and is planning a super work-shop for his new home. He asked the guild members for ideas on the configuration of an ideal facility. It was recognized that such a plan would be heavily dependent on the type of work that might be performed so the suggestions made were broad and far ranging. It was acknowledged that there can be three distinct areas for activities that might not mix: a dusty/dirty area, a machine area, (a spray-paint area) etc. Phil Mattson urged a well-lighted sit-down bench for fine/precision work. Tom Taylor said: Don't forget to provide a drawing board and tools. Bob Cornell cautioned not to have fluorescent lighting over a table saw as strobe effect creates a safety hazard.

# OUR "MODELER OF THE QUARTER" -- PHIL MATTSON:

We had a special treat at the November meeting. During the coffee break we all went below to view the new "MOTQ" display which was chuck full of Phil's models. The 'centerpiece" is a model of a three island freighter in 1/8 scale (411' Cargo Steamer, 1918??) with superb detail. Besides other assorted static models, he has included many of his ships-in-bottles. (he's been hiding these from us.) One corner of the display case has a 3 or 4 masted sailing vessel half-way in the bottles' neck with the necessary tools laid-out to show how it would be completed. Another is a similar model Phil made for his mother when he was 11 years old. (let's see now, how old would the model be if .....)

If you haven't seen this display, stop by the Berkeley and check this case out. Phil's model of the USS BENNINGTON is in an adjacent case and is a unique treat by itself. Congradulations, Phil and the guild thanks you for making these models available for public viewing.



# A plank-on-bulkhead model.

Such is the affection Canadians hold for the BLUENOSE, they've struck her likeness on the reverse of the Canadian dime. And for good reason. She was built in 1921 at Lunenburg, Nova Scotia, as a banks fisherman; working the rough waters off Newfoundland, her speed soon became apparent. In her first year she won the International Fishermen's Trophy Cup and in challenges over the next 17 years she never lost it. She was lost on a reef off Haiti in 1946.

BLUENOSE's strong and graceful form has become the epitome of the fishing schooner, the image we call to mind when we hear of the Grand Banks. As such, she is one of the most frequently modeled boats in North America. BlueJacket Shipcrafters is proud to announce a new, redesigned version of this classic schooner, developed by Nova Scotian Philip Eisnor, who has devoted nearly endless hours to research on the original lines and construction of BLUENOSE.

The result? A magnificent new model, one that accurately reflects the extra strength built into the schooner's hull, rigging, winches and ground tackle to fit her for the strenuous work on the Banks. # **LACKAWANNA**

Steam tug, 1900

The coastal tug LACKAWANNA was a floating advertisement for the coal she hauled. She was owned by the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad and built in 1900 by John Dialogue and Sons in Camden. New Jersey. The 137' iron-hulled steam tug was painted white to show off the clean burning qualities of the hard anthracite coal she burned, an important product of her owners. While it did burn cleaner and more efficiently than soft or bituminous coal, it was still disastrons for the LACKAWANNA's white paint and kept the crew constantly busy cleaning and repainting.

The LACKAWANNA was driven by a single 950-horsepower engine, powered by two boilers, each with its own stack. She worked the East Coast, pulling barges filled with coal from Pennsylvania to the industrial centers to the south and the northeast. Her graceful sheer and yacht-like finish made her stand out among her fellow work boats.

The LACKAWANNA was lost on a sandbar north of Pollock Rip in Nantucket Sound in 1915 during a violent snowstorm. The crews of the barges she was towing, however, managed to anchor them, saving their cargo until Coast Guard vessels were able to tow them to Boston.

Our LACKAWANNA model, developed by W. Paul Hitchcock of Downeast Model Shipwrights of Portsmouth. New Hampshire, represents state-of-the art quality in kit manufacturing. From the pre-carved basswood hull to the specially designed etched brass pilothouse and deck plates, cast brass ventilators and propeller, accuracy and quality have been the primary concerns. With a myriad of brass parts and over 40 fine Blue, lacket britannia metal castings, wood, rigging cord and decorative flags, this kit will let you produce one of the most interesting small steamer models we have ever seen.

The 20-page instruction book, written by the kit designer, is a model of clarity and is voluminously illustrated with drawings and photographs. Two pages of full-size plans are included, printed on bond paper.




