





That's what TROY WATERS sells through his company "Harbor Models." Broke down and sent \$5 for his latest catalog last month. Received a 29 page illustrated catalog plus a separate 7 page (single-spaced) price list. I was delighted!

The listed models are arranged by manufacturer, (I counted 37) and while some offered only one or two models, the total choice was indeed wide. Many, if not most of the manufacturers offer complete fitting sets including running hardware, i.e. shafts, propellers, rudders etc. Some tugs feature kort nozzles, bow thrusters, shrouded propulsion units and even deck cranes. Available in accessories are 8 different speed controls, a good selection of electric motors plus everything you might want for lighting, sound effects and other electronic devices






### U.S. RADIO CONTROL BOAT & SHIP MODELER:






## The Passenger Ship in World War II

everal of today's cruise lines played proud and important roles in World War II. Cunard, P&O, parent company of Princess Cruises, Holland America, and Delta Queen all made important contributions to the war effort as troop transports and armed merchant cruisers. Among the best known were Cunard's Queen Mary, Queen Elizabeth and Aquitania. They carried Anzacs (Australian or New Zealand troops) in the Far East, American troops to Europe, and German and Italian POW's to North America. Each of the Queens carried over 800,000 wartime passengers. Their main damage was the

overwhelming amount of chewing gum left on the decks, and the rails which were so heavily carved with initials they had to be replaced. The Queen Mary however, sustained some damage in a tragic collision with HMS Curacuo,

24 hours out of Scotland, in October 1942. Traveling at 30 knots, the Queens traveled alone. No escort could keep up with them, and safety lay in speed. They carried approximately 15,000 at a time, and in summer entire divisions slept on deck. The Aquitania served Cunard 35 years, throughout World Wars I and II without a single incident or misfortune. In addition to the many Cunard ships which served, the seized ships of other nations were managed by Cunard. 
Holland America contributed a number of ships. Nieuw Amsterdam II was converted to a troopship in Singapore in 1941. early in her career, and carried almost 400,000 war personnel in 44 vc = ges. In addition to transporting troops, she took part in the evacuation of butch nationals fleeing Java. Veendam II rescued survivors from the torpedoed

British aircraft carrier Courageous. Later seized by the Germans, she was used as a submarine depot, sunk and refloated. Zaandam II, serving as a troop transport, was torpedoed and

sunk off Brazil. Five men escaped on a life raft with provisions for 16 days, and held the record for the longest recorded survival at sea, 83 days. Two, including a U.S. Navy ensign, died shortly before rescue by a USN patrol ship. The unfinished Westerdam I was sunk three times in Rotterdam by the Dutch resistance as a harbor barrier and to prevent her use by the Germans. She was refloated, completed, and was the first liner to re-establish service to America for the Holland America Line. The historic Peninsular & Steam Navigation Co., Ltd. (P&O),

# August F. Crabtree, carved miniature ships displayed at museum





GRAFTON, Va. — August F. Crabtree, creator of a collection of 16 miniature ships on display at the Mariners' Museum in Newport News, Va., since the 1950s, died Thursday at the age of 89.

Mr. Crabtree, who began his carving career as a child, needed 28 years to complete the collection on display at the Mariners' Museum. Some of the work is so small and intricate that a magnifying glass is needed to see all the details.

In the 1950s, he sold the collection to the Mariners' Museum for \$75,000 and began a career as an artist, lecturer and guide for the museum.

He also carved miniatures of presidents of the United States that are about one-fourth of an inch tall.

parent company of Princess Cruises, contributed much to the war effort, and lost a number of ships. The Stratheden carried approximately 150,000 troops, and took part in the invasion of North Africa. She was the first ship to pass through the submarine zone of the Atlantic and Mediterranean after war had been declared. Her sister ship, the Strathallan was sunk during the invasion of North Africa. Not only were P&O losses heavy, but after the war when ships of other lines were being reconditioned and returned to passenger service, P&O ships were delayed in being released from government service due to their suitability for troop transport. 
Following Pearl Harbor, casualties were transferred from hospital ships arriving in San Francisco to the steamboat USS Delta Queen for transport up area rivers to inlar hospitals such as Sacramento. This was done under cover of night to keep the number of injured a secret. Throughout the war, the boat, now painted battleship gray, and designated YFB-56 (Yard Ferry Boat), ferried Pacific-bound troops from Treasure Island to San Francisco to board troop transports tied up at piers at Fort Mason or along the San Francisco waterfront. After the war, the flow reversed with the Delta Queen going to Alameda NAS to pick up returnees coming in on the giant carriers. 

Hundreds of passenger liners — most renamed during their wartime service - played vital roles in the war, and many were lost. The French Line — owners of the Normandie — Swedish American Line, U.S. Lines, American Export, Anchor, Norwegian American Line, Canadian Pacific, and Furness Warren Line contributed greatly, and suffered losses as well. Three of American Export's "Four Aces" were sunk in enemy action off Casablanca and Guadalcanal, and only the Exochorda survived.


