






Figure 8-2.—Names of mooring lines and numbers of bitts.




Figure 6-1.—Old-fashioned, Navy, or stock anchor.




Figure 6-2.—Types of patent onchor.

#### Getting to Hampton Roads

The Hampton Roads area is 3 hours south of Washington DC on Interstate 95 to Interstate 64. Airline service is available through the Newport News/Williamsburg and Norfolk International airports. Rental cars are available at both airports. Newport News is also served by Amtrak. Further information regarding transportation and accommodations in the Hampton Roads area is available upon request.

#### The Mariners' Museum









## The Man Who Saved the 'O'Brien' Earns Awards From Preservationists

### Patterson Receives Two Major Honors

SAN FRANCISCO — Retired Rear Adm. Thomas J. Patterson of the U.S. Maritime Service, who saved the Liberty ship Jeremiah O'Brien from the scrap yard and led the effort to sail it back to Normandy last summer after 51 years, has received two major maritime-preservation awards.

Both honors, the World Ship Trust Maritime Heritage Award and the American Ship Trust Award, recognized what many consider to be the most remarkable feat of maritime preservation in years: getting a half-century-old ship ready for an ocean voyage and then sailing it across the Atlantic, where it was the only vessel of the thousands involved in D-Day to return for the invasion's 50th anniversary.

"When President Franklin Delano Roosevelt ordered the world's largest fleet of ships built and manned, it is unlikely that he dreamed one of them would return to sea at age 51 with a crew of 70-year-old World War II veterans," Mr. Patterson said as he accepted the awards. The O'Brien made 11 shuttle runs from England to the Omaha and Utah beaches during the invasion.

The World Ship Trust Award is given each year by the London-based World Ship Trust, whose vice president, Edward G. Zelinsky, presented the award to Mr. Patterson at a ceremony last month aboard the O'Brien.

The American Ship Trust Award is given annually by the National Maritime Historical Society in Peekskill, N.Y. It was presented by Karl Kortum, founder of the San Francisco Maritime Museum.\*

The story of how the Jeremiah O'Brien managed to become one of two out of an original fleet of 2,751 Liberty ships to survive to the present day is something of a legend in the maritime community.

Mr. Patterson, working as a surveyor for the Maritime Administration in the early 1960s, stumbled upon the O'Brien anchored among

hundreds of dormant Liberty ships in the Suison Bay reserve fleet east of San Francisco. The O'Brien and all the remaining Liberty ships were on the Navy's scrap list.

But the O'Brien, although tarnished from years of inactivity, caught Mr. Patterson's attention. Unlike other Liberty ships that had been converted into hospital ships or modified in countless other ways, the O'Brien was completely unaltered. All its original fittings, charts and even log books were in their proper places, just as they would have been on the day the ship was launched in 1943.

"I made a mental note to save her from the scrappers," he said.

Guided by Mr. Patterson and others through a bureau cratic labyrinth, the ship was named to the National Register of Historic Places in 1978. A year later, its original triple-expansion steam engine restarted, the O'Brien left the reserve fleet and became the country's first operating memorial merchant ship.


But the crowning moment of the long preservation effort came last June, once the ship had arrived off

the coast of Normandy after an arduous six-week voyage from its home port of San Francisco.

The voyage was made to honor the wartime contributions and sacrifices of the thousands of civilian merchant mariners who served on ships like the O'Brien. Some 7,000 merchant seamen perished at sea in enemy action when cargo ships filled with munitions, including many Liberty ships, were torpedoed by enemy submarines and fighter planes. But the nonmilitary, unionized seafarers had never been fully recognized by the United States for their contributions to the war effort.

Much of that changed, however, at a sunrise Naval ceremony aboard the aircraft carrier George Washington on June 6, when Mr. Patterson was asked to assist President Clinton in laying a wreath for all those killed at sea 50 years earlier.

"It was the most solemn moment any of us had ever experienced," Mr. Patterson said. "It was the day the U.S. Merchant Marine was brought fully into the fold of all the U.S. armed forces. Our mission was accomplished.".
