

172 BREMEN(IV)

29, (1929-42) 51,656. 938 x 101. Quadruple screw, turbines, 26 knots. Built by A.G. Weser, Bremen. M.V. Bremen-New York, 16 July 1929 in record breaking time, making the crossing at an average speed of 27.83 knots to win the "Blue Riband". At the outbreak of World War II, sailed to Germany from New York by way of Murmansk and along the Norwegian coast, successfully eluding interception. Gutted by fire believed to have been set by member of the crew at Bremerhaven, 18 March 1942. Found to be beyond repair and stripped to water line; broken up



173 EUROPA(I)

'30, (1930-46) 49,746. 936 x 102. Details as (172). Built by Blohm & Voss, Hamburg. Launch the day before BREMEN but construction delayed for nearly a year by serious fire in yard. M. Bremen-New York, 19 March 1930, breaking BREMEN's westbound record at an average spee 27.91 knots, Remained in German ports throughout the war. Turned over to French Governm as reparation 1946. Assigned to French Line; renamed LIBERTE (198).

'40, (1946-64) 33,961. 723 x 93. Twin screw, turbines, 23 knots. Built by Newport News Shipbuilding & Drydock Co, Newport News, Virginia. M.V. New York-West Indies, 10 August 1940. Commissioned as U.S. Navy transport 1942; renamed USS WEST POINT (AP-23). Refitted at Newport News 1946; renamed AMERICA. F.V. New York-Le Havre, 14 November 1946. Sold to Chandris Lines 1964; renamed AUSTRALIS.

ED WHITE agreed to make these changes. -- Del Mar Fair volunteers were again asked to notify JACK KLEIN if they cannot make a scheduled work period. Twenty-four hours in advance is needed to line up a substitute.

We welcomed two guests and a new member at this point. MIKE WAYS, a 20 year resident, is building LaCoronne from a Heller kit. CARL PANDEL saw our flier in an Escondido hobby shop and came on down. Carl has built the Emma C. Berry. CHUCK FELKINS is a new member and also a 34 year resident, ex-Argonaunt and "pond watcher." He served aboard Iowa-class battleships and is building the Wisconsin in 1/8th scale. Besides seeking plans for revenue cutters and clippers, he was looking for plans to the "Star" for which he was told how to obtain quite easily.

BOB CRAWFORD displayed a kit of an Americas Cup boat which will be saved for our next auction. He had entry forms for "Design in Wood" for the Del Mar Fair. Bob also made a strong plea for our support for the Ship Modelers Assc. show on the Queen Mary in March "98. This will be their third show and besides many neat models, this show drawa top vendors with tools, kits, supplies etc. He further pointed out that the San Francisco area clubs supply many entries. Considering our closer proximity, we should do lots better. In Nov. '98, our Maritime Museum will host the national conference for the Nautical Research Guild. Bob will be looking for volunteers to help as chairmen for this event.

111 UNITED STATES

'52, (1952-69) 53,329. 990 x 101. Quadruple screw, turbines, 33 knots. Built by Newport News Shipbuilding & Drydock Co. The largest passenger ship built in the United States. M.V. New York-Southampton, 3 July 1952. Won the "Blue Riband". breaking by a wide margin the transatlantic speed record previously held by the QUEEN MARY by making the eastbound crossing at an average speed of 35.59 knots. Existing record also broken on return westward passage. Laid up at Newport News, November 1969.




(April Meeting Notes - cont.)

At this point it was time for coffee.



'22, (1922-40) 14.127. 535 x 72. Twin screw, turbines, 18 knots. Built by New York Shipbuilding Board, M.V. New York-Stremen, February 1922, Renamed PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT three months later. Rescued crew of British cargo ship broken up 1948, SJOSEPH T. DICKMAN (AP.26) Laid up at Suisun Bay, California, March 1946; ≯

'68, (1969-) 65,863. 963 x 105. Twin-screw, turbines, 28 knots Built by John Brown & Co, Clydebank, Glasgow. Left Greenock on shakedown cruise to Canary Islands, 23 December 1968. Acceptance delayed as a result of turbine troubles; F.V. Southampton-New York, 2 May 1969.



18 QUEEN MARY

'36, (1936-67) 81,237. 1,020 x 118. Quadruple screw, turbines. 29 knots. Laid down 1930 by John Brown & Co. Work suspended late 1931 due to economic depression: resumed April 1934. M.V. Southampton - New York, 27 May 1936. Became undisputed holder of the "Blue Riband" in August 1938 with crossings at speeds of 30.99 knots westbound and 31.69 knots eastbound: a record held until 1952. Laid up at New York at outbreak of war; converted to troopship at Sydney. Australia 1940. In collision with escorting cruiser H M S CURACAO which sank with loss of 329 lives, 2 October 1942. Resumed passenger service, July 1947. Sold to City of Long Beach. California for conversion to floating museum and hotel; delivered after voyage around Cape Horn. December 1967.


APRIL SHOW & TELL:

LEW JOHNSON kicked-off this portion of the meeting with his Viking model of "Roar Ege", a 1:25 scale exact replica of "Skuldelev 3". This was a small, but well-built merchant vessel, 14 meters in length and built around the year 1000 in Denmark on the banks of the inlet a Roskilde. Lew said he gave "K.C." money and got a box of wood in return which was actually a Billings kit. Lew also mentioned that a museum was built on the site where this vessel was discovered. The oak trees from which the ship was built were all cut by hand as were the planks and for unknown reasons, had sails made of wool. (for winter voyages??)

FRED FRAAS displayed two 1/16" (1:192) scale C-2 merchant ship hulls. One was scratch-built (bread & butter poplar) and the other from a Bluejacket kit recently given him by a good friend. He also displayed a home-made clamp and explained how he glues up his hulls. Fred recently attended a waterfront "workshop" concerning the status of the USS MIDWAY carrier museum, and gave a brief run-down on its' progress. They plan to have it open at South Navy Pier on July 4, 1998 and have already procured nine aircraft for on-board displays.

DAVE MANLEY laid out five sections of the main deck of his battleship "Yamato" in 1/8" (1:96) scale. This model will be over nine feet long and 16" wide. It will feature 6 float planes as well as over 100 lighted port holes (from fiber optics) and of course it's world famous 18" guns, the largest ever built. Dave will make a fiberglass hull from his plug and the bow portion will free flood to lessen the weight/ballast problems associated with R/C operations.

Guest MIKE WAYS showed his "LaCoronne," his first wooden ship model. GARY EMERY was sailing with A.P.L. when he picked-up a model junk in Singapore in 1955 which he brought to this meeting. He mentioned after checking the authoritative reference, The Junk Blue Book, he concluded this model was a composite of several types of junks and prbably made just for tourists. - PHIL MATSON gave a progress report on his "Alfred" and discussed the Hahn method of making dead eyes out of ebony. Phil also discussed his waxed carving of the figurehead to be cast in bronze and seemed to prefer this method over lost wax casting in which he also has considerable expertise.

'32, (1932-44) 51,062. 879 x 97. Quadruple screw, turbines, 28 knots. Laid down by S.A. Ansaldo, Sestri Ponente, for N.G.I. ;transferred to Italian Line during construction. M.V. Genoa-New York, 27 September 1932. Broke the westbound speed record August 1933, making the crossing at an average speed of 28. 92knots. Bombed and sunk by British aircraft south of Trieste 9 September 1944; raised and broken up Yugoslavia 1947.


SCALE SHIP MODELER MAGAZINE:

'40. (1946-68) 83,673. 1.031 x 118. Quadruple screw, turbines, 29 knots. Built by John Brown & Co. Clydebank, Glasgow; the largest passenger ship in the world. Left the Clyde for New York under wartime conditions. 27 February 1940. Served as troopship 1940-46. Refitted for passenger service 1946; F.V. Southampton - New York, 16 October 1946. Sold for use as exhibit and convention centre at Fort Lauderdale, Florida, 1968. Sold to Orient Overseas Line 1970, renamed SEAWISE UNIVERSITY and registered in Bahamas. Refitted for cruising and schoolship service at Hong Kong 1971.



Acquired by United States Lines and refitted at Newport News, Virginia, 1923. F.V. New York-Southampton. 4 July 1923. Laid up at New York 1934; sailed to Rosyth. Scotland for breaking up 1938.




194 ILE DE FRANCE

'27, (1927-58) 44,356. 792 x 92. Quadruple screw, turbines, 24 knots. Built by Soc. des Chantiers et Ateliers de St Nazaire, Penhoet. M.V. Le Havre-New York, 22 June 1927. One of the most famous and popluar liners of the pre-war period. Converted to troopship by French Government 1940. After fall of France seized by British forces at Singapore and served as Free French transport throughout war. Resumed temporary passenger service 1946; later returned to trooping to Indo-China until April 1947. Completely reconditioned at St Nazaire 1947-49; funnels reduced to two. F.V. Le Havre-New York, 21 July 1949. Withdrawn from service November 1958. Sailed as FURANZU MARU February 1959 on delivery voyage to Osaka for breaking up.
