#### **Community Build Report**

**Build Log Keeper Steve McGivern** reported 10 members attended the January 6 meeting aboard the *Berkeley*. At right, the meeting begins by going around the table with each builder discussing progress and challenges with their Royal Barge Circa 1700 build.


**Ken Selzer,** below left, opened the discussion talking about his planking. One end of a plank had split and asked about how to attach another plank. The conversation moved onto a

discussion on the ways to clamp planks.

John Sanford showed how he used rubber bands, attaching the bands to both



sides of the frame going over the keel. John cautioned about warping the keel.



**Ed Torrence** talked about a slight tweak he had in his keel as he built out the frames.

Guy Lawrie said he was just starting his keel build and described the need to taper the pieces. Mike Lonnecker suggested the use of double sided tape to keep the keel flat and straight on a jig or build board. Mike also suggested a high quality hand-held planer for shaping. **Bob Kyle** showed his build and discussed his challenges with planking. He stated that any early mistakes are exacerbated as you further the build.



Mike Lonnecker shared a great reference book for planking; Planking Techniques for Model Ship Builders by Donald Dressel. Steve McGivern studies the book below!

Mike said that he was using a modified admiralty build. He intends to plank one entire side and partially plank the other side.



# Show and Tell

#### HMS Royal Sovereign, a restoration

#### An offshore purchase, perhaps the Philippines?

Jon reports a visit to the Museum Model Shop by model owner **Joe Renteria**, pictured below, with *Royal Sovereign* in a sorry state of disrepair. HMS *Royal Sovereign* was a 100-gun first rate ship of the line of the Royal Navy, which served as the





flagship of Admiral Collingwood at the Battle of Trafalgar. This will be a challenging restoration but Jon reports the model is of good quality. Additional history of the ship can easily be found on Wikipedia but let us explore Joe, a centenarian with a Native American heritage, who is a noted photo journalist with a storied past starting as an 8-year-old orphan. His work ranged from duty conducting photo reconnaissance from land and from air in the


Pacific during WWII to later service on Admiral William "Bull" Halsey's staff. He photographed Eleanor Roosevelt, Presidential inaugurations, and ran San Diego State's photo lab but he is also noted for his work with Native American advocacy groups. # Caldercraft Model Boats, Heritage Series Scale 1:80

Tom reports this high quality kit features walnut CNC cut parts and a double plank on frame hull with black and natural hemp for rigging. Wikipedia reports "The *Mary Rose* is a carrack-type warship of the English Tudor navy of King Henry VIII. continued next page



#### The Mary Rose 1545 by Tom Hairston continued:

After serving for 33 years in several wars against France, Scotland, and Brittany and after being substantially rebuilt in 1536, she saw her last action on 19 July 1545. While leading the attack on the galleys of a French invasion fleet, she sank in the Solent, the straits north of the Isle of Wight.



The wreck of the *Mary Rose* was rediscovered in 1971. It was raised in 1982 by the Mary Rose Trust, in one of the most complex and expensive projects in the history of maritime archaeology. The surviving section of the ship and thousands of recovered artefacts are of immeasurable value

as a Tudor-era time capsule. The excavation and raising of the *Mary Rose* 

the *Mary Rose* was a milestone in the field of maritime archaeology, comparable in complexity and cost only to the raising of the Swedish 17th-century warship *Vasa* in 1961. Tom is reporting the keel, stern post and stern are nearing completion and he is making good progress.

Alex reported his progress on applying copper strips to cover the hull. After fairing the hull and beginning the process to cover the hull, Alex said developing patience and resisting the urge to rush the work was his greatest challenge. Alex reports that though this build presents some difficulties, overall he believes this has been a very good kit for folks new to




ship modeling. Alex also sent out a thank you to Isaac Wills for supplying him with additional copper strips after he used all his kit supply.

Please note the following show and tell offering is built from a kit of dubious origin and as noted in previous newsletters, kit duplication is a practice that cannot be condoned. Isaac's experience with this model certainly underscores how corrupted these kits often are.



Halcon (1840)

Isaac previously reported not much is known about *Halcon*, a



the U.S. revenue cutter Harvey.

Isaac reports that the unidentified manufactured kit's only useable parts were the bulkheads, cap railings, and fife rails. All other parts are built from scratch. The kit instructions were unreliable and Isaac reports considerable research effort was necessary to advance the project. For example, though the kit instructions called for a 32 pound canon to be mounted amidships between the masts, the correct armament is a mortar. He reported he has consulted the Maritime Museum's tops'l schooner *Californian* for guidance rigging *Halcon* and its cannons since it also is a tops'l schooner. He is drawing a sail plan from the tops'l schooner *Lynx* due to its similar hull configuration.



#### **USS** Monitor

#### **Scale 1:32**

The purpose of this picture is to capture the scale of the deck sheeting, obtained by Karl long ago and probably designed to support RC components through the empty deck spaces.





#### USS Monitor by Karl Zingheim continued:

Karl reported he "purchased the *Monitor* set on eBay with an eye towards producing a cutaway display of both the *Monitor* and CSS *Virginia* (for the Midway Museum). The Museum went in another direction, so

I had a completed turret cutaway from another modeler and a partial set of custom deck plates with no immediate assignment. This material sat in storage for about a dozen years when I came across a couple of maritime artists' renderings of the *Monitor*'s foundering in the gale of 13 December 1862. Since the ironclad's decks were largely awash in the scene, I decided that the 1:32 scale size was no longer such a liability for personal modeling



since about half of the model would be submo



model would be submerged, and therefore, out of sight. I need only portray what was still above water. Further research revealed the harrowing details of her abandonment, and how some men did not leave the turret (seen at left) when she finally succumbed to the seas. When the turret was salvaged, a pair of skeletal remains were found beneath the overturned guns. Facial reconstruction on the recovered skulls led to a likely match with a crewman from Wales who is seen in a photo on deck from earlier in the ship's career."

### USS Port Royal and Octarara

#### **Scale 1:96**

Karl reported on progress with his diorama based on the sloop *Richmond* reported in previous newsletters. "The screw sloop *Richmond* in 1:96 was intended for a Vicksburg campaign diorama, but the relatively smooth progress in her scratch build encouraged me to promote her assignment to the epic Battle of Mobile Bay instead, where she can be depicted with her sisters *Hartford* and *Brooklyn*, as well as the rest of Farragut's squadron. Since



she was now going to be at Mobile, I embarked on fashioning her battle consort, the sidewheeler *Port Royal* (and the sister *Octarara*, note the extra "a") while awaiting white metal parts for the *Richmond*. To take the *Richmond*'s place in the original Vicksburg scene, I will convert a Revell *Kearsarge* kit into the USS *Iroquois*, who was also present for the CSS *Arkansas*' foray out of the Yazoo and down the Mississippi to Vicksburg."
