Show and Tell



Jay MacMaster brought in his custom rope walk along with his fabricated masts, bilge pump, and canon for his model of his U.S. Brig Syren (1803). Pictured to the left; as members gathered for the celebration, Jay and Howard Griffus examine Jay's rope walk. In the background, Mike Hite (seated) and Chris Sullivan get settled on the passenger deck of the Berkeley. His Syren is a modified kit constructed with natural woods for all ship coloring with a goodly part of the ship's hardware







fabricated by **Jay** from scratch. As reported on in previous newsletters, much of the model's construction is based upon his research into the original admiralty plans.

Show and Tell continued:



Doug Ward (pictured to the left) showed his Artesania Latina 1:35 model of the schooner *Independence* (1775) at the celebration. 'Ages of Sail' wrote that the model "is a faithful replica of a colonial topsail schooner with six cannons that helped to consolidate the United States as an independent nation." He spoke about his surprise at finding the kit's stern was simply the cast metal part shown in the pictures below and, along with other modifications to enhance the appearance of the finished model, he completely rebuilt this significant part of the model. **Doug** also brought

with him a pandemic project, a ship in a bottle, the *Lively Lady*, also pictured below. The Ships-A-Sailin' kit, a very old and no longer produced kit, was picked up at the Maritime Museum's Model Shop for a donation to the museum. If interested in any of the kits, materials, or plans the Guild maintains in the Model Shop, please contact **Jon Sanford** and you might walk away with a treasure, too!



Heights bother you?

Mike Hite sent along pictures (see below) to share of his "training ship" for future projects, the *Black Pearl*. He reports he received the model kit from an associate from abroad and it has been a real challenge with plans being just so-so. He reports that the parts are laser cut yet are of some laminated wood so the laminations show after each part is glued in place. He reported that the kit included some very nice die cast parts that have great detail. He said he was able to paint the stern ornamentation that he will add later to the model because it turned out quite nice. He also said he will try furled sails on a model for the first time.







Show and Tell continued with a Mike Hite restoration:

Mike additionally sent the picture to the right of a restoration he tells is a "very old, solid hull clipper ship." He reports finding some really fine details in the model that revealed themselves as the model was cleaned. Though **Mike** said that he has not restored any models that were dated, this one has the builder's initials carved in the base, "P G". He noted the model has very fine wire inside the railings and since most of the wire is missing from the model he is planning to replicate and replace the wire.



Don Dressel was reluctantly unable to attend the Guild's celebration but in his stead he sent along the following update on his extraordinary model of **HMS** *Roebuck*. The HMS *Roebuck* was a fifth rate British Navy frigate completed on 4 August 1775 at Chatham Dockyard. She served in the American Revolutionary War (Assault on Philadelphia, Operations against Charleston, blockade duty), the French Revolutionary Wars, the Anglo-Dutch War and the Napoleonic Wars. During her long career she had many awards (long list). She was a two-decker designed by naval architect Sir Thomas Slade in 1769 as an improvement on his *Phoenix* model.

The model is scratch built using boxwood, holly, Swiss pear, ebony, bamboo (dowels), and brass primarily. The scale is 1:64 based on plans by Harold Hahn and information obtained from Greenwich in England, among other sources.

This article pertains to the current progress on the model. The fore deck is being laid down the center of the ship leaving the port and starboard areas open to be able to view the lower decks and hold. The comings and hatches are in progress and the belfry has yet to be constructed, but the Brodie stove and vent stack are installed. The metal scrapper shown in the photo on the fore deck is used to scrape the bamboo dowels flat with the deck before sanding. A few planks will be installed port and starboard on the fore deck also due to the "walkway" that has to yet be installed on either side between the poop deck and the fore deck. Lots of work yet to be done.



The quarter badges are also still being worked on. After the belfry is finished, the next challenge will be the double ship's wheel.
