Talk the Plank



Members Art Arroyo, Don Bienvenue, Bob Costa, Kent Cross, Frank Dengler, Don Dressel, Tom Hairston, Guy Lawrie, Chuck Seiler, James Pitt, Alex Roel, Jon Sanford, Chris Sullivan, John Walsh, Doug Yumoto, and Powder Monkey Karl **Zingheim** arrived for the celebrations, as well as ship modeler **Steve Miller**. Due to pizza, normal protocols about Guild business and model project sharing were set aside for the sake of merriment, but some subjects that transcended the consumption of pizza and salad appeared: Jon Sanford returned from his travels in Europe with a handful of interesting cocktail stir sticks that resembled oars in miniature. Seeing creative potential in these sticks, Jon kindly distributed them and posed a challenge for artistic excellence in rendering said swizzlers into attractive *objets d'art*. 






















BUILD LOG: HELLER AMERIGO VESPUCCI BY DON BIENVENUE

A new feature debuts with this issue—a running build log on a popular sail subject, *Heller's* 1:150 kit of the Italian Navy's training ship *Amerigo Vespucci*! The kit has an overall length of 27.5 inches, and stands more than 18 inches high. With more than 400 separate parts, the *Vespucci* will be a challenging and involved build, even for Don!



The *Amerigo Vespucci* joined the Italian Navy in 1931, and survived World War II intact. As a leading example of an oceangoing tall ship, she is a frequent participant in tall ship gatherings in ports around the world. In this capacity, Don visited the *Vespucci* twenty years ago when the tall ships massed in San Diego. Although of steel construction, there is an excellent assortment of beautifully crafted woodwork throughout, according to Don. Due to the kit's complexity, Don opted to start with sub-assemblies, such as boats and fittings. He also elected to pre-paint the hull halves before joining them.






The kit is replete with small boats, eleven in all, of various types. Don decided to get them all assembled first.





Don then moved on to some of fittings, including a knightshead, fife rails, saluting batteries, and anchors.



The Vespucci has a straightforward paint scheme, so Don applied the three-tone colors even before the hull halves are joined.

Next month, Don will demonstrate how to render wood decks from plastic!
