Our own webmaster **Alex Roel** opted to turn his oar into a base to support a truly tiny admiralty model of a tall ship on the blade. The model sports open ribbing below the waterline, as well as a full length spar deck, and masts and yards. The detail is worthy of a scene from Gulliver's Travels!



Taking the blue ribbon is our favorite newly-graduated naval architect, **Isaac Wills,** who can't get enough out of original boat design. In this case, Isaac employed his oar as a jib boom for his mostly two-dimensional representation of a gaff rigged cutter. Talk about creativity!







In this fourth installment on Don's build log, the deck is largely fitted out and he turns to completing the masts and yards prior to stepping and rigging.




Don has now installed the deck furnishing sub assemblies as well as the assortment of ship's boats. The *Amerigo's* deck is remarkably crowded for a sail vessel.





Looking aft on the main deck. Note how the special flare of the lower portions of the ladderways connecting the quarterdeck, an unusual feature for ships.

Don shifts over to the masts and spars. Since the material is plastic, the fine taper and spindly thinness of the yardarms may look accurate for scale, but they may prove troublesome in bending under the strain of tensioned rigging later. Having the final rig pull in opposite directions will be a must for these parts.

The masts are stepped, though the foremast is awaiting its spars.

Show & Tell

As shown in previous newsletter editions, Don Bienvenue is steadily progressing on his Heller 1:150 kit of the Italian tall ship *Amerigo Vespucci*. A large subject, even at that scale, the kit will eventually build into an imposing model when fully rigged. Don was fortunate to visit the actual vessel, and his photos are proving helpful in adding more detail to the kit.







Master artisan Tom Hairston took on the repair of a Museum display model of the whaler *Charles W. Morgan* that had been badly damaged in an unfortunate accident. As he removed the original rigging and repaired the fittings, Tom compiled more than 11 pages of notes to aid his restoration. The Museum requested tempered glass for the new case, so Tom had to take the model back home to Modesto to get the special order case completed before hauling the model back to its home aboard the *Berkeley*.






Chris Sullivan displayed his nearly finished rendition of the Hasegawa 1:700 kit of the Japanese light cruiser *Tenryu*. Though her design was obsolete by World War II, her torpedo battery still made her a formidable opponent in night actions. Build largely out of the box, with a few additions from Chris' spares box, the cruiser is painted in the "Yokosuka" style of dark gray. Chris employed EasyLine material to start the rigging.









Jay Ward's Model Shipways kit of the famed Mayflower is one year along, partly due to the substantial scratchbuilding **Doug required to** make the project worthy of the original. Aiding Doug in his magnificent effort are a series of photos he took while aboard the replica Mayflower II.



In honor of the festive season, Karl Zingheim brought over recent additions to his stash of kits including a 1:35 twin U.S. five-inch 38 gunhouse from the World War II era, an Occre kit of the Antarctic exploration vessel *Endurance*, and a novel 1:350 kit of a sectional floating drydock by Takom.
