Holy Bass (fiddle) Boat, Batman!









Thanks to Guild members **Chari Weiss** and **Chuck Seiler**, we have news of SDSMG life member, and former newsletter editor, **Katherine Pogue** who was featured in the Grays Harbor Historic Seaport's Magazine *Currents* recently. The following is condensed from a nifty interview featured in the Washington publication: Katherine is a rated Near Coastal Sailing Master of the sail brig *Lady Washington*, a key element in the Grays Harbor seaport. She guides the movie-famous brig on learning cruises for enthusiastic volunteers along the North American Pacific coast. Katherine started sailing at age 16 with our own Maritime Museum after a thrilling experience with the *Star of India* overnight program in 5th grade! After college, Katherine returned to tall ships and worked up to the captaincy of *Lady* in 2021. She has found that cruising the Puget Sound area offers gorgeous scenery and exciting visits to the greater Seattle region. Katherine emphasizes the teamwork that emerges from sailing and how that provides fine lessons for life. Hopefully, we will enjoy the pleasure of Katherine's company again in San Diego, perhaps with the *Lady Washington* gracing the Embarcadero soon!

Show & Tell





New member Bob Camp opened the door to an entirely new form of modeling with a pair of 3D printed Vietnam-era Swift boats. He was gifted a completed HO scale (c.1:87) model (with the figures aboard) and obtained the printing program for the model. He then drafted a new printing program to accurize the model and produced the other version seen above. The complexity of the structures are amazing, and will gives modelers new vistas to explore! Don Dressel presented his newest project, the Dusek 1:72 kit of the 16th century war galley La Reale, which served as the Christian flagship for the allied fleet that defeated the Ottoman force at Lepanto in 1571. A subject with an extreme lengthto-beam ratio, this is a kit for experienced modelers only. To assist in the tricky framing and planking, Don uses Tight-Bond for its slow setting time. This narrow model features 330 individual frames and walnut structures. As with many kits, Don finds the tricky instructions to be part of the challenge!





Tom Hairston continues his ongoing program of building models of the each of the Maritime Museum's vessels, in this case, the workboat *Butcher Boy* in 1:22 scale. Using plans from Kevin Sheehan's Museum library, Tom employed basswood in a plank-on-frame manner to replicate the newest addition to the Museum's fleet.









Chris Sullivan showed us the latest progress in his 1:700 SMS *Scharnhorst* scene, including weathering, particularly around the prominent funnels, and a skillfully scratchbuilt Asian junk, symbolic of the German armored cruiser's Far Eastern station before the First World War.



Isaac Wills brought in a remarkable demonstration of the toy maker's art with this whimsical Lego brick kit of a pirate ship, complete with a decorated interior. Though marketed for kids, these Lego kits attract dedicated adult builders as well and can no doubt inspire children to take up our hobby in many ways. Isaac modified the build from a brig to a bark while sitting out COVID.













Dave Yotter also displayed an update to his Western river paddle tow boat project. This time, the rigging was installed, and additions made to the deck house details. The remarkably realistic paint rendering comes from Floquil paints, which produce exceptionally flat matte finishes.



Rainy weather forced a postponement of what Karl Zingheim intended to present, so instead, a fortunate eBay find was substituted. This is the 1:20 scale Hasegawa ketch *Seatopia* which should build into a fine addition to his growing flotilla of sail cruising yachts.
