


From the Quarterdeck by Guild Master John Walsh

The March meeting was attended by 17 Members and 1 guest; all Officers were present¹.

Powder Monkey Karl Zingheim struck the bell at precisely 6:00pm to bring the meeting to order. The lone guest was former long-time member Tommy Thompson who is returning to our Guild after having moved back to San Diego from

Oregon. While exiled in the Pacific Northwest Tommy was working on his build of Sir Ernest Henry Shackleton's ill-fated ENDURANCE and will now continue his work here.

The Officer reports followed with Purser Jon Sanford reporting that the Guild's financial status is sound (detailed information in our website's Sea Locker) but that several Members have yet to pay their annual dues and run the risk of becoming ex-Members. As Web Master I reported that John Walsh and I had had a productive meeting preparatory to handing over the Guild's website to his care. Newsletter Editor Karl reminded Guild Members that submissions of current builds are always welcome, especially for Members unable to attend meetings and do a Show and Tell in person.

Guild Master John Walsh then turned the meeting over to Log Keeper Isaac Wills to conduct the annual Officer elections. As his last act in this position Isaac accepted a floor motion from Mike Lonnecker to elect the nominated Officers by general acclamation. This was quickly seconded, and an immediate vote by show of hands approved the nominees, instantly putting Isaac out of his job.

Paco López de Arenosa informed the Guild that the barquentine JUAN SEBASTIÁN ELCANO will be visiting San Diego April 11th-16th. She is a training ship for the Spanish Navy; Paco once had the good fortune of sailing aboard her on a trip to Cadiz for refitting.

James Pitt (welcome back James!) announced that he will be taking orders for Guild short- and long-sleeved t-shirts and hats during upcoming meetings. He suggested that Members place orders soon to ensure having the items in time for the upcoming San Diego County Fair.

The principal event of the night was the latest in the "Scratch That" series of presentations; the topic this meeting was **Weathering**.

 Isaac demonstrated his first attempt at weathering with his plastic galleon / East Indiaman BLACK PEARL. The main areas Isaac tackled were the hull and the decks. As the

to the waterline, Isaac weathered the hull with successive coats of paint of various hues of gray, brown and matte black mixed and lightly sanded to produce the charred effect.

 Karl discussed three different kinds of weathering: rust (green for copper and orange/red for iron and steel), grime, and shadows (a judicious use of light gray.) Karl also described his weathering method of overlaying paint layers using different bases: one coat of enamel can be weathered (diluted)

by hand with thinner and not be affected by a top coat of acrylic then weathered (diluted) by water. Karl concluded with two main messages for Members: "weathering comes down to contrast" and "less is more – use restraint."

- Chris Sullivan used his LST tank landing ship as an example of weathering on a very small scale. Chris also noted that another type of weathering to consider is wear, such as where lines or cables rub or anywhere constant contact occurs on any vessel. Chris' weathering watchword: "balance."
- Steve Scheet shared a box of tools and paints that he uses to weather his builds, including a simple thin plywood board that serves as his test palette prior to application. Steve also mentioned his use of "brass black" and how it can be used for different metals, not just brass.



Dave Yotter brought in his KC BELLE paddle wheel river barge to discuss his

representation of smoke and oil weathering using Floquil enamels, noting how cinders and soot

accumulate in the various nooks and corners of the deck and deck furniture due to the twin smoke stacks.



Glenn Clausson then caught the imagination of Members with his ad-hoc addition to the weathering discussion by relating a story of how he had stored several of his models in cardboard boxes for a number of years only to find the models

"naturally weathered" by silverfish when he next opened the boxes.

The Guild Master then called for the break, after which the Guild moved on to Show and Tell (see next section.) After the final presentation, the Powder Monkey struck the bell at 8:03pm to bring the meeting to a close.



Don Dressel led off with his "newish" build of the Swedish warship VASA,

notorious for having sunk on her maiden voyage in 1628. This is a plank-on-bulkhead kit build, and Don has just completed the first planking; he stressed that it is important to

would fall when roughing in the first. He also noted that Corel has a patented "gun port" planking system utilized on this model, and that this is the first model he has ever seen that has a beakhead assembly separate from the hull itself. Don pointed out that this is not an easy kit and getting the beakhead assembly to align properly will be an unwelcome additional step.



Next up was Chuck Seiler with his build of Captain John Smith's circa 1608 shallop from the Jamestown settlement. Built in England, disassembled and shipped to the

New World, this vessel was used to navigate the waters in and around Chesapeake Bay. Chuck

reported that one year into the build he is now in the "I remember why I hate rigging" stage, for which he has used five diameters of line. He found that his mast/yard assembly was very rickety upon completion but became stable when properly rigged. Chuck chose not to hang sails and then researched where each running line was secured when stowed. Remaining items: 3 rope coils, 10 oars and 1 barrel. Chuck plans on entering her in the 2024 Design in Wood competition at the San Diego County Fair.

Kurtis Sellen was our third presenter with his double-planked, triple-cockpit, barrel-backed Chris-Craft Runabout circa 1930. Kurtis inherited the partially-built

kit from an old acquaintance, and his

first order of business was to amend

first order of business was to amend some of the previous owner's work. That accomplished, Kurtis is now is contemplating his decking options: utilize the kit wood (mahogany), use teak, or stain another wood to effect.

TROIL Call an interview with Guild Member Steve Miller

How did you come to call San Diego home?

I was raised in Wisconsin and joined the Marines in 1986, stationed at Camp Pendleton. I really enjoyed San Diego and never left.

Tell us a bit about your life/career path.

After settling here, I pursued a degree in Mechanical Engineering at SDSU. I met and married my wife and we now have two kids. Since graduating, I have worked for the US Navy as a civilian aircraft engineer. I am edging closer to retirement with mixed emotions, but I would definitely be able put more free time to good use.



How did you come to the Guild?

I have been "working" on my wooden Constructo 1:58 scale PRINCE DE NEUFCHATEL since around 2001. There was very little progress in those first two years, and many mistakes, and I eventually put the her away, and in ordinary she sat. After watching a Pirates of the Carribean moviefest with my kids in late 2022 I decided to dust off PRINCE, committed to finishing the project I had started so long ago. I joined Model Ship World in search of help, and there I met the Guild's very own Chuck Seiler! He was kind enough to invite me to a Guild meeting and I joined on the spot. It didn't hurt that my first meeting was a pizza party.

Do you recall your first model?

When I was 8 years old I built the German battleship TIRPITZ in 1:700 scale. I played with it a bit, but she finally met her demise thanks to some lighter fluid and Black Cat firecrackers, as was befitting an Axis

ship at the time. Another formative model came one Christmas when I was 10 years old: I received a CVA(N)-65 USS ENTERPRISE with the beehive-shaped phased radar array and an airwing complement of F-4s,

A-4s and others. In 1:350 scale, it was huge to my 10-year-old brain. I built her without paint and added all the decals, but the fabulous part was the airwing: which I did paint in metallic orange with light blue canopies. Just awesome!

Of the models you've made, which is your favorite?

My 1:720 scale Italeri kit of <u>CVN-71 THEODORE ROOSEVELT</u> from the Persian Gulf circa 2015 is my favorite. There was lots of research and scratch building required

in order to

modernize the kit, and the airwing is almost like a model in and of itself. The PRINCE DE NEUFCHATEL is my first ship made of wood and will likely be my

favorite when she is complete, as I am enjoying the creative process of compelling wood to take the desired forms.

Describe another avocation you enjoy.

I have been collecting HO scale Milwaukee Road trains and rolling stock over the

decades that remind me of growing up in the Midwest. I have recently started putting together a small layout, and have been converting the locomotives to digital

horns and more. It is a very impressive and fun technology.
