


Fine, fine, I've got it now!



If an adversary demands parley, you can do them no harm...

Parley was invoked three times this meeting:

- 1) Rigging Line. Chari Wessel brought up the problem of making a realistic catenary curve in a hanging line. Her situation was that her lines were already rigged... Steve Miller demonstrated how he created a catenary line by swabbing the line with a 50/50 solution of white glue and water and then placing one or more small clamps on the line to weigh it down by gravity naturally until it dried...
- 2) Piracy. Mike Hite raised the issue of model kit piracy and to what lengths a modeler should go to avoid aiding piracy in our craft. This raised a couple of scenarios including 1) a kit clearly documented as having been pirated and 2) a non-pirated (in public domain) kit offered by a company also known to offer pirated kits. Several Members chimed in on this sometimes confusing and divisive topic...
- Rope Coils. Steve Miller floated a couple of questions: 1) was it necessary to have a rope coil at every line tied off to a belaying pin and 2) could the coil be added after the line is tied off (not one continuous line.) John Walsh (among others) stepped up noting that yes, the standing end must be of sufficient length to be able to be usable and perform its various working functions, thus an ample length of coil is required. General consensus seemed to allow that "adding" a separate(d) coil to the belayed line is fairly standard practice (and will be invisible in most every instance.)



Chuck's build is a knarr, a Viking merchant cargo ship capable of long sea voyages. Chuck is going to fashion this clinker-style knarr to resemble one of the circa 1030 Skuldelev ships, excavated off the coast of Denmark that commenced in 1962.







Chris Sullivan followed up Mike's American LANDING CRAFT with his own circa 1944 Imperial Japanese Navy (No. 101-Class) LANDING SHIP. This is another of Chris' waterline builds and will feature support boats and tanks, primarily of plastic with detailing in photo-etched brass.

Guild Master **Steve Miller** showed off the current status of PRINCE, now masted and with the standing rigging completed on the bow sprit. Steve also used the footropes of the spritsail yard to demonstrate how he makes catenary curves utilizing gravity and clamps as brought up in Parley earlier in the meeting.

Don Dressel closed out Show and Tell with his circa 1939 battleship NEW JERSEY (more cage masts!) which was bombed and sunk at Pearl Harbor, then raised and refitted to fight at Leyte Gulf.



Squared Away – understanding nautical terms

The **PLANKSHEER** is the uppermost strake of a vessel's hull, while the SHEER STRAKES make up most of the upper sides. The **BROAD STRAKES** are the lower strakes on the side and bottom of the hull and the GARBOARD **STRAKE** is the lowermost strake adjacent to the keel and set into the RABBET of the KEEL.



I enjoy studying history and collecting Imperial Japanese sake cups.


